



School Committee To Visit Klamath

The High School-College Relations Committee of the Oregon State System of Higher Education will visit Klamath Falls High School February 24 at 9 a.m. Principal Charles Carlson has announced. The principal of Henley High School has arranged for their seniors to attend the session.

Among the visitation team will be representatives of all the institutions of higher education as well as Oregon Technical Institute. The committee is headed by Francis Nickerson, executive secretary, who is headquartered with the State Board of Higher Education at Eugene.

An assembly has been called to explain general college preparation and requirements. Later sessions are held by the various representatives to discuss specific requirements of their institutions. Parents and interested pupils are invited to attend the meeting.

This visitation is offered annually as a regular part of the guidance program carried on in the high schools to help students in the area of college and other post high school training.

LETTER FROM WASHINGTON

The activity of the House, which has been running under a slow bell thus far this year, is expected to show a sharp acceleration from now on. The annual appropriations bills will begin appearing on the floor. The big school construction bill is about due for action. The expanded highway construction bill which failed of passage last year will probably get out of committee in a couple of weeks. Bills to extend the corporation and excise taxes will be coming along soon.

House consideration of farm legislation will be late in the session this year. Much in the news now is a big "omnibus" farm bill but that bill is in the Senate where it will be acted upon first. Last year, by a very narrow margin, the House passed and sent to the Senate a farm bill which among other things restored the rigid 90 per cent of parity price support program. Since that bill is still pending in the Senate, any farm bill passed by the Senate will have the technical status of an amendment to our substitution for the House-passed bill. The effect of that situation, so far as the House is concerned, is that the only way the House will have a chance to consider the new farm program will be in the form of a conference report.

The Department of Interior Park Service has formally launched its great 10-year National Park Improvement and Expansion Program. This master plan will be known and publicized under the name "Mission 66" (completion target date being 1966). One sentence in a beautiful booklet (not printed at government expense) which the Park Service is distributing tells the story simply and clearly: "The Mission 66 program envisions serving more people better with increased facilities, equipment and personnel." The recently announced \$381,500 improvement budget for Crater Lake Park is actually a part of the Mission 66 program.

Although the big highway modernization bill is still under consideration by the committee, Mr. Sam Baldock, Oregon state highway engineer and a national leader on the subject of highway legislation, says he believes the bill will provide for a 13-year program which for the inter-state system alone will provide an expenditure of \$24 billion. Mr. Baldock was in Washington not long ago and stopped in at my office long enough to give me some very interesting figures based upon what he now thinks will be in the bill. If the legislation is passed reasonably soon 15 million dollars can be expended on the inter-state system in Oregon this year. Next year, he says, a total of 46 million dollars would be expended on Oregon highway building. The increase in the amount of money invested in Oregon during the 13-year life of the program would be 22 million dollars per year. Result: Lots of jobs and lots of sorely needed highway mileage and no additional taxes levied in Oregon.

This year the Public Works Committee is not going to attempt to write the revenue raising part of the highway bill. It got in serious trouble when it attempted to do that last year. The tax section will be written by the Ways and Means Committee. It is anticipated

that additional motor fuel and some increase in automotive excise taxes will raise money enough to pay for most of the program in 15 years. There will be no long term bond plan as was proposed last year. Baldock estimates that the new Federal taxes will cost about a penny for every 10 miles you drive—but that benefit would be as much as 10 times the cost.

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Crater Lake Cottage Cheese Apple Pie

1 unbaked pie shell 1/2 cup salt
1 1/2 cups sliced apples 1 cup light cream
1/2 cup sugar 1 cup milk, scalded
1/2 cup cinnamon 1/2 cup vanilla
1/2 cup nutmeg 1/2 cup Crater Lake cottage cheese
1 egg 1/2 cup sugar

Mix apples sliced with 1/2 cup sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg; turn into pie shell and bake in hot oven 15 minutes. Meanwhile beat eggs slightly, add 1/2 cup sugar, salt, cream, vanilla and sieved cottage cheese. Reduce oven heat to 325 degrees. Pour custard mixture over apples and continue baking until custard is set, about 40 minutes.

Crater Lake Cottage Cheese Cookies

1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup, single action
1/2 cup flour 1/2 cup milk, scalded
1/2 cup salt 1/2 cup cottage cheese
1 egg 1/2 cup sugar

Cream butter and cheese until thoroughly blended. Sift flour, measure, and sift with sugar, baking powder and salt. Add gradually to first mixture. Form into a loaf. Chill overnight. Slice thin. Place on slightly oiled baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven 10 minutes or until brown. Makes 40 servings.



Cottage Cheese Sailboat Salad

1 pint cottage cheese
lettuce
6 canned cling peach halves
green pepper
canned pimiento

Make low mounds of cottage cheese on lettuce-lined salad plates. Top with 2 drained peach halves. Fill each with cheese. Set "sail" cut from green pepper upright in each and circle with pimiento. Serves 2.
