

# Oregon Tech Wallops Yellow Cab USF Expected Cage Victor; Dayton, Louisville Collide

## Owls Win; JVs Meet Lassen JC

Oregon Tech found a surprisingly "soft touch" Thursday night on the OTI maples as they fashioned a one-sided, 71-36, basketball victory over the defending Southern Oregon AAU champions, Yellow Cab of Medford in a non-conference game.

The resounding triumph by coach Wally Palmberg's hoopers was the only action of the week for the Mile High Campus, although the Oregon Tech junior varsity under the coaching of Jim McGown will trade baskets with Lassen Junior College tonight and Saturday evening at OTI.

The next cage action for the Owls is slated to unfold next Tuesday night at Ashland as the Owls and Red Raiders of Southern Oregon clash for their fourth and final Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball meeting of the year. At the present time, OTI holds a 2-1 margin in the series this season. Then next Friday and Saturday, Palmberg's Owls will host Oregon College of Education in the final home and conference play of the season for the Mile High Club.

Thursday evening at Oregon Tech's gymnasium, the Owls picked off a win, as many expected they would, but did it in a fashion of the coming "Fare" wins. Little of the respected AAU power that was expected from the C-ies failed to materialize as the Owls dominated the full-game's play.

Only at one point — within the first five minutes of play — did the Owls take a back seat to the Cabbies from Medford. With exactly five minutes gone in the contest, Bill McLean, former SOC standout, pumped in a two-pointer from far out with a push shot to give Yellow Cab a 4-3 lead. But a ringer from the field by Ted Fischer put the Owls in front 5-4, a lead they never lost.

Sparked by the driving of Fischer and Bobby Whitman, the Owls bubbled up to a 32-17 half-time lead, as added backboard help came from the two "Jumping Johnnies" — Foster and McCutcheon — and Jerry Fasteen gave the Owls near domination of both backboards.

In the second half, Foster and Fischer piloted a scoring drive that pushed the Owls to the front 43-21 with 15:57 remaining to play. With the second period halfway gone by the boards, Tech managed a 49-23 lead.

Fischer pumped 16 points through the nets to sweep the evening's scoring honors, 12 of which came in the first half to send the Techers out in front with a mood cushion. Bill Werner of Yellow Cab fired in 11 points to lead his club, while McCutcheon added 10 for the Owls. All 10 of the Oregon Tech players to see action broke into the scoring column as Palmberg made good use of his bench during the tussle.

Tonight's Oregon Tech Jayvee-Lassen Junior College game will start at 8 o'clock.

## Gil Turner, Gene Fullmer Head TV Bout

## M. Fetchick Sets Record In Golf Open

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UP)—Mike Fetchick is one golfer who may be happy if the predicted cold and wet weather hits the \$20,000 Texas Open today.

The 33-year-old Mahopac, N.Y., pro set a new course record with a nine-under-par 63 in the first round of play Thursday, and Fetchick could have a better chance of holding onto his three stroke lead if bad weather sets in.

Fetchick sailed over the 6,476-yard par 36-36-72 Fort Sam Houston course Thursday in balmy 90-degree weather, sand has a reputation for playing well under poor weather conditions which were forecast for today.

Manuel De La Torre of Milwaukee, who tied for the low qualifying score with a 68, chipped two strokes off that in the first round to place second with a 34-32-66. ## NCAA Reveals TV Plans

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The NCAA has come up with the 1956 version of its football television program, and in all essentials it looks just about like last year's offering.

There are to be eight national Game of the Week telecasts and five regional TV showings. The '56 format was disclosed by Wall Byers, executive director of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. It represents the plans of the NCAA's Television Committee. Ratification by the membership is expected to be mere formality.

Following closely the outlines of last year's television setup, the 1956 plan specifies four dates—Sept. 22, Oct. 6, Dec. 1 and national telecasts. An additional four dates are left open, to be selected by sponsors of the program. The remaining five Saturdays are set aside for intra-district telecasting. Member institutions will again be allowed to make their own arrangements.

Once again, a member will be limited to appear only on a national and once on a district telecast—or twice on district showings.

Last year, NCAA refusal to permit telecasts by certain stations of the sell-out Notre Dame-Iowa and Oklahoma-Texas games caused an uproar. Under the 1956 plan again these telecasts would be banned.

Differences in the '56 setup compared with the previous year include:

1. A game played more than 400 miles away from the visiting team's home may be telecast back to the team's home TV area.
2. Sell-out games may be telecast to the home TV area of the home and visiting teams in the TV locale of the game—if it is played off-campus.
3. A team may participate twice in a telecast not released in its home NCAA district and these telecasts will not be counted as appearances.

Small colleges will be exempt from all appearance restrictions.

## MICHIGAN TO PLAY UCLA

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Rose Bowl opponents Michigan State and UCLA may sign up for a home-and-home football series in 1959 and 1960, says Athletic Director Biggie Munn of MSU.

"We want to keep on playing one coast team a year," says Munn.

Michigan State concludes a two-year pact with Stanford this year, then plays California in 1957 and 1958.

There have been 10 two-hit World Series games. The last was by Vic Raschi of the Yankees against the Phillies on Oct. 4, 1950.

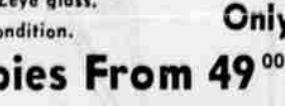

## USF Expected Cage Victor; Dayton, Louisville Collide

San Francisco's Dons should push their major college winning record to 46 straight games tonight against St. Mary's of California, but if you're looking for the really big basketball action of the night, pal, hustle on to the Louisville Armory. It's where Dayton's flyers get another crack at the Louisville Cardinals.

Dayton, ranked second only to the Dons in the Associated Press poll, has won 19 of 20 games this season. The one that got away was flched 64-62 in overtime by Louisville, ranked fourth and currently 20-2.

The return match between the two NIT-bound clubs should be a pip. These two outfits have battled into overtime in their last three meetings.

Another important game tonight sends UCLA to Oregon State for the first of a two-night pair. UCLA tops the Pacific Coast Conference at 8-0. Oregon State, the defending champ, is only 2-8.

None of the ranked teams were in action last night, but West Virginia's Hot Rod Hundley filled the void with an entertaining exhibition at the Mountaineers defeated St. John's of Brooklyn 82-75 at Madison Square Garden.
