THE CAMERA CORNER

"Today let's discuss correct exposure . . . your best answer to a clear, sharply defined picture. Black-and-white film has some latitude, permitting two or three lens stops over or under exposure while still giving a printable negative. On Wednesday, January 18, the squad visited the Klamath Falls Fire Department.

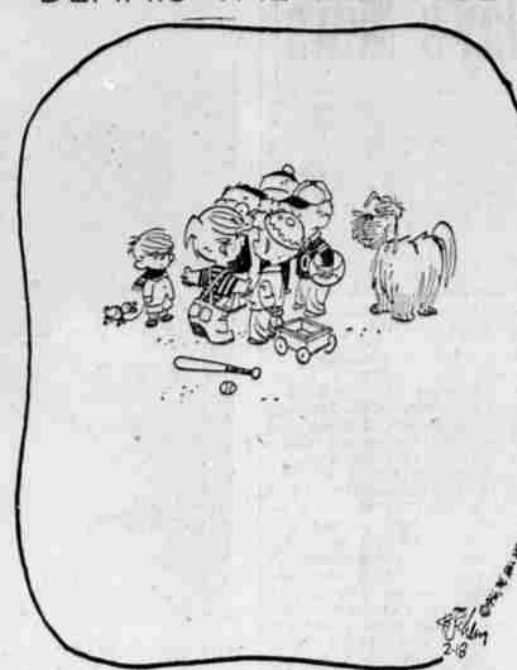
The capella choir from KJFH sang to us on Thursday, February 16. The group sang three numbers under the direction of Andrew Loney.
