treatment to young seedling potatoes is Ted Dallas Sr., who operates a 200 acre ranch in the Livingston area near Merced in the fertile San Joaquin Valley. He is enthusiastic over success of the experiment.

"The system is an insurance against crop failure," reported Dallas. "Previous methods of providing heat to help plants reach maturity proved uncertain."

Dallas began his hotbeds three years ago. Some 30 other farmers in the area have taken the cue from him and will begin similar operations this spring.

Small electric cables are buried a few inches underground in seed potato beds, providing an even, controlled temperature for the delicate seedlings. After a six weeks "hot-foot," the slips are transplanted to fields and nature is allowed to take over.

The idea isn't confined to sweet potatoes. The kilowatt also has invaded tomatoes in the Midwest and flowers on the West Coast. Power companies and agricultural scientists have promoted use of electricity as a means of controlling crop production for at least 20 years. Acceptance of the improvement on nature has been only limited in the past three years, but extensive installation of electrically controlled "hot beds" is anticipated for a wide variety of crops in the future.

Initial expense of the "hot-foot" for yams is compensated in results, Dallas said. An estimated 30 per cent less seed is required with soil heating than with old methods and maintenance of hotbeds is at a minimum.

Dallas has installed 20 beds, each 7 1/2 feet wide and 120 feet long with eight cables stretched parallel one foot apart and buried at a depth of 12 inches. Each bed produces enough seedlings to plant from six to seven acres.

Four or five times daily, temperatures at ground level and below the ground are checked by thermometers. When various temperatures are reached, electric current is sent through the cables to spur the seed into life.

good year in 1955," Harlow H. Gurley, company president, and Alfred P. Sloan, chairman of the board, reported in a special statement made in advance of the company's annual report.

The pay of the workers was up an average of nearly \$11 a week from 1954, when the weekly average pay was \$91.44.

The number of workers drawing the pay checks also was up sharply. In 1954 hourly-rate employment averaged 367,462 in United States plants. In 1955 hourly-rate employment was up to 410,022.

Workers in the car, truck, body and assembly divisions did even better than the average for all General Motors workers. They drew weekly pay checks averaging \$104.77. In 1954 their checks had averaged \$95.34.

Total employment in all GM plants throughout the world was 624,011 salaried and hourly-rate workers, who earned \$3,127,145,514, the report said.

YOUR CONGRESSMAN SAYS

The Senate Agriculture Committee has voted for a return to rigid 90 per cent parity on millable wheat, corn, cotton and peanuts. The Soil Bank plan is included in the bill it approved.

It voted a two-price system on rice with 90 per cent support for that part of the crop sold in the United States, a lower price for that sold abroad.

The rice program, if it passes, may be a trial run for a two-price wheat program. Many wheat growers seek parity for wheat sold in the United States for human consumption; market price for that sold abroad or for feed.

A battle is expected on the floor of the Senate on its committee's farm bill, between those who want to go back to rigid parity and supporters of the flexible price support system.

Budget requests have been made to expand our farm research program by 25 per cent. Funds are included for the Agriculture Department's study on how to cut the cost of food distribution, so that the farmer's share of the retail food dollar can increase instead of shrink. Funds will also be used to seek new uses for farm products, to develop new crops, to find new markets and to increase sales.

Oregon farm income for 1955 shrunk only one per cent below that for 1954. Here is hoping that the bottom of the drop in farm income has been reached and that we will have an increase in 1956.

Electric power from the John Day Dam under the provisions of my bill would cost 2 1/2 mills per kilowatt hour. Power from waste heat from the Hanford, Washington plutonium producing plant under Senator Morse's proposal would cost from about 4 mills on up.

It sounds loco to me that Senator Neuberger is against 2 1/2 mill power at the John Day Dam under my bill, yet Senator Morse favors Federal power from Hanford, although the lowest cost estimate on it seems to be slightly under 4 mills.

Both Neuberger and Morse seem to want only federal power, regardless of the cost. I want more cheap power, regardless of the source, and I want it before we have more brownouts.

\$179,000 in federal school construction aid has been reserved for School District No. 12, The Dalles by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. \$68,400 has been reserved for Madras Grade School District 9-C in Jefferson County.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration has allotted \$19,600 to the city of Pendleton to acquire land for a clear zone at the Pendleton Airport.

A Postal Rate Increase bill has been introduced into Congress in a new attack on the postal deficit. It would raise the first class mail rate from three cents to four cents; air mail from six to seven cents; and put percentage increases on all other classes of mail.

I listened to Sir Anthony Eden, the British Prime Minister, when he spoke to the House of Representatives. He received his biggest applause when he said, "We are sincerely grateful for the economic aid we have had in the past... but apart from a measure of defense aid which we value... we now stand on our feet... and we intend to continue to do so."

Socialists joined with the right-wing Free Democratic Party to oust Arnold, 102-99, on a motion of nonconfidence.
