lural steel girders with concrete deck. F. L. Summers, Medford, has been awarded the contract for earthwork, clearing of the site for the approaches now under way, removal of old streets, walks and curbing, construction of approach fills at each end of the crossing and for the clover leaf fills. Material for the fills is coming from a cut which will be part of the proposed West Side bypass. Summers will also be responsible for drainage and re-location of sewers. This sub-contract was let for \$182,000. The paving bid went to Ray Byrnes, Klamath Falls, for \$107,000. Illumination of South Sixth Street from Commercial to Adams, on the span and the installation of traffic signals will be done by the Steck Electric Company, Roseburg at a cost of \$35,000. This contract calls for an automatic flashing signal for the OCAE railroad spur west of South Sixth Street, new traffic signals on Sixth and Seventh streets between the overpass and

long-awaited highway improvement was released today by R. W. Ellison, resident bridge engineer for the Oregon State Highway Department. The single-deck overpass will be constructed with Oregon state highway and federal funds in the amount of \$399,964. The low bid went to Tom Lillebo, Reedsport, Oregon. Cleanup work on the bridge site was started this week. Lillebo will build the concrete and steel overcrossing to cost \$375,640. This cost will include the driving of 770 treated timber pilings to support the bridge, the pouring of 3,600 cubic yards of concrete in the structure proper. This figure does not include sidewalks, curbs or gutters. The four lane artery will be of reinforced concrete except for the three center spans over the railroad tracks which will be struc-
