## Knickerbockers, Hawks Losing Out

The St. Louis Hawks and New York Knickerbockers each were in the midst of a damaging losing streak Monday and unless they right themselves but quickly they're liable to be on the sidelines come National Basketball Assn. playoffs time.

The fading Hawks blew their sixth in a row Sunday night, this time to the Fort Wayne Pistons, 89-83. The Knickerbockers lost their third in succession, 118-98 to Syracuse and dropped into the Eastern Division cellar.

In other games, the Minneapolis Lakers downed the Rochester Royals, 109-93, and the Boston Celtics tripped the Philadelphia Warriors, 120-118.

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# Santee Fires Back Over Life Suspension; Plans Amateur Status Campaign

NEW YORK (UP)—Miler Wes Santee today charged the National AAU with "star chamber proceedings" in suspending him for life and demanded to meet his accusers "face to face in a real fair American trial."

Charles P. Grimes, Santee's attorney, declared he meant "to accomplish a complete vindication of Santee as an amateur and restore his rights to compete as an amateur and in the Olympics."

Santee, America's No. 1 miler and his best hope for a gold medal in the 1500-meter run at Melbourne, Australia next December, was suspended for life by the AAU Sunday for allegedly accepting about \$1,500 in excessive expense money for competing in various meets.

Also suspended were Al Frank, described as Santee's agent in California, and Fred Van Dyke, vice president of the Pacific AAU. Tom Moore, promoter of the Modesto Relays, also was charged with paying Santee excessive expense money for competing in the meet.

Santee announced through Grimes immediately following the announcement of the AAU's action that he "will sue in a New York civil court enjoining the AAU from carrying out the suspension."

Dan Ferris, secretary-treasurer of the AAU, revealed that the Executive Committee voted, 14-1, to suspend Santee. The dissenting vote was cast by Lew Wilkie, last year's AAU president, who contended the matter should be referred to the Missouri Valley Assn. of the AAU.

The Missouri Valley Assn. originally suspended Santee for alleged violations of the amateur code last Oct. 11 but reversed the decision by a 21-7 vote on Nov. 20. The case was reopened in December.

Santee was charged specifically with accepting excessive expense money from three California meets: the Modesto Relays, the Stockton Pacific AAU Championships and the Los Angeles Coliseum Relays. The AAU said he received about \$800 from those meets and also received about \$600 for competing in various meets in Cleveland, Chicago, Philadelphia and Washington.

## Nashua Still Top Horse In Miami Today

MIAMI, Fla. (P)—The great Nashua lost little if any esteem for the unexpectedly tight finish of the Widener Handicap in which he, the odds-on favorite, came home less than a length ahead of the next three horses.

Running the mile and a quarter feature Saturday without a tussle race beforehand, he didn't get the lead until the last few yards and won by only a head over Social Outcast.

Social Outcast was a head in front of Sailor, who in turn was a neck ahead of Find. It took a photograph to decide the order in which the horses came in.

Nashua had to show his best to overcome the strategy of the Alfred G. Vanderbilt pair, Find and Social Outcast.

Find, a great sprinter, led the race at a terrific pace until deep in the stretch drive. Then Social Outcast, who finishes his races with a tremendous burst of speed, plunged up from last position and barely missed.

Sailor, who had run side by side with Nashua almost the entire way, hung on to pass the fading Find. The \$92,600 purse made Nashua the second million-dollar winner in racing history and places him with striking distance for the record.

With \$1,038,015 already won, Nashua may stay in Florida and try to surpass Citation's \$1,085,760 in the \$50,000-or-more Gulfstream Park Handicap.

## Weight Lifter Busts Record

HONOLULU (UP)—Tommy Kono, 164-pound muscle man from Sacramento, has smashed two of his world weight-lifting records, one of which will be recognized by AAU authorities.

Kono set a recognized mark at 2½ Hawaiian A.U. meet Friday by pressing 295½ pounds. It bettered the old mark of 292½ which he set last summer in Leningrad.

He also recorded a total lift of 955½ pounds, 32 pounds better than his world record total lift in France in 1954, but officials here said the mark would not be recognized.
