Dairymen's Association Elects Ed Winz President

The Klamath Dairymen's Association and the Klamath Dairy Herd Improvement Association elected new officers at their joint annual meeting held Monday at the Winema Hotel.

The new officers of the Dairymen's Association are Ed Winz of Olene, president, and Mrs. Ida Seals of the Midland district, vice president. Ray O. Petersen was re-elected secretary.

The Dairy Herd Improvement Association selected its five directors. They are Ray Hobson of Merrill, Wilbur Relling of Poe Valley, Ken Waters of Montague, Stanley Masten of Poe Valley and Ed Born of the Hill Road.

Promotional programs for dairy products occupied a great part of the meeting, where a full discussion of the recently organized American Dairy Association for Oregon, an affiliate of the nationwide American Dairy Association, was held.

The Oregon association was set up because it was felt that it could do a better job of raising promotional funds than the Oregon Dairy

Commission, a governmental agency.

Under the program, a voluntary collection of two cents per hundred pounds of milk produced will be collected at the producing plant. There would be no collections during May and June, when collections to finance the work of the commission would be made.

The association would work on the state level and contribute to national promotional activities for milk and dairy products.

The groups also discussed briefly the expansion of the use of refrigerated bulk tanks on the farm to hold milk until it is shipped. Petersen said that this method of milk storage is being rapidly expanded here.

Plans for the annual Spring

Dairy Show, to be held in June at the county fairgrounds, were also discussed, but the exact date will be set later.

The Dairy Herd Improvement Association heard a report on the increase of cows covered by their program in the year 1955. At the

close of the 1954 testing year, there were 785 cows under test. Late in the 1955 testing year, which ends

next April, there were 1148 cows in the program. The group also announced the appointment of a new

tester, Frank Manley, who will replace Richard Beck. Beck has accepted a position in Idaho.
