**Rape Charges To Be Issued**

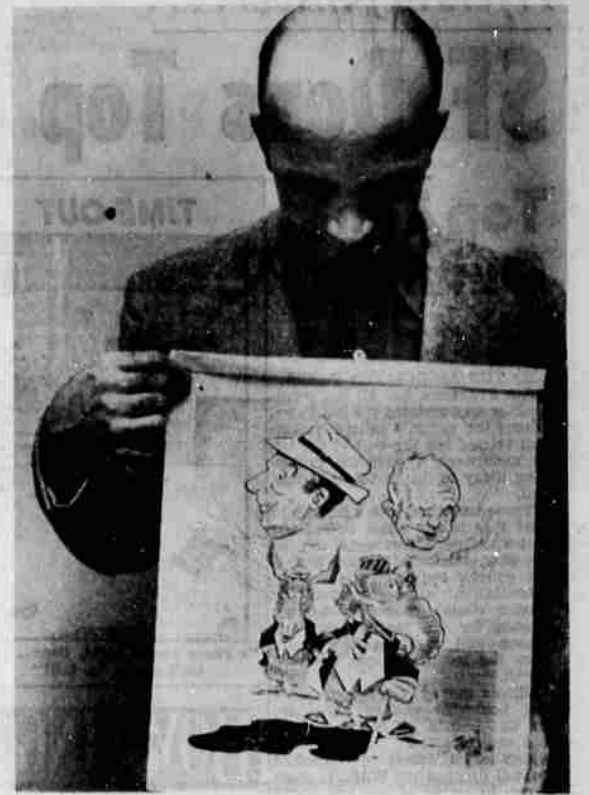
**NEWBURG, Mo. (P)—**Prosecuting Atty. Jay White of Phelps County says warrants charging rape and kidnaping will be issued today against an Army sergeant accused of forcing a 9-year-old Newburg girl into his car and raping her on a lonely country road.

State police said Sgt. Harvey M. Johnson, 28, a chunky brown-haired father of a 6-month-old daughter told them after his capture last night, "I'm sick and in a mess."

Officers said Johnson neither admitted nor denied raping the girl and had made no statement. The 200-pound sergeant, stationed at nearby Ft. Leonard Wood, offered no resistance when captured. The girl was in his parked car.

Police said the girl, identified as Norma Jean Phelps, was taken to Phelps County Hospital at Holla, where an examination established that she had been raped.

Witnesses reported Norma was with another girl when a man grabbed her and forced her into his car. The other girl fled.

**Lower Voting Age Asked**

**MINNEAPOLIS (P)—** Dropping the voting age to 18 cannot bring anything but good for the nation and the time for such legislation is now, Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn) told a University of Minnesota convocation audience today.

The senator said such a change was needed, "If only to keep the nation on an even electoral keel."

"What I mean," Kefauver said in his prepared text, "is that the life expectancy is going up and up, and every year our society contains a larger number of old people. Consequently, the decisions we make at the polls are coming to reflect a disproportionate weight of judgment by the aged."

"We honor them and venerate them. But who can deny that a person's outlook at 70 is different than it was at 30. And who will say that the older viewpoint is better than the younger, or vice versa?"

"Ideally, we should have a balance of viewpoints. The best and easiest, and I think the only way to strike that balance is to lower the voting age to 18 and give youths its chance to be heard."

Kefauver's talk came between visits to St. Paul and Minneapolis industrial plants and a luncheon with university faculty members. He will wind up his four-day Minnesota campaign tour with a public rally at the labor auditorium tonight.

The senator, opposing Adlai Stevenson for Democratic delegates in the state's March 20 presidential primary, ended his outstate appearances last night at Fairbault.

There he held a Junior Chamber of Commerce audience that farmers' purchasing power is the lowest since 1940 and that it is affecting business on the nation's rural main streets.

After spending the night here, Kefauver departs by commercial airline tomorrow for Alabama.

**Time Study Issue Bobs Up In Westinghouse Dilemma**

**WASHINGTON (P)—** A bothersome time study issued bopped up again today to complicate government efforts to settle the 128-day Westinghouse Electric Corp. strike.

Mediators thought for a time yesterday they had the time study issue out of the way under an agreement to postpone it for 90 days. Involved is a proposed company re-evaluation of worker output.

James B. Carey, president of the striking International Union of

Electrical Workers, said he wants assurance that if other strike issues are settled, there would be some way to resolve the time study question at the end of a 90-day period.

But negotiators for Westinghouse maintain they agreed to postpone the time study issue with an explicit understanding they were not committed to arbitration or any similar method of solving it in the future.

The IUE wants the right to appeal to a neutral any company-ordered job changes resulting from the time study. Westinghouse insists such decisions are solely for management.

Federal and private mediators working on the case wanted to get the time study issue checked to the sides so they could get down to wage and other issues holding up an agreement.

Approximately 55,000 Westinghouse workers members of the IUE and Independent United Electrical Workers, struck last October when a two-year contract came up for renegotiation of wage rates. Westinghouse proposed scrapping the agreement and entering a new five-year pact granting annual raises eventually aggregating a minimum of 23 1/2 cents an hour.

The IUE insisted on completing the remaining year of the present contract. But it has offered a three-year plan calling for a 7-cent hourly increase during the first year. Prestrike pay rates averaged \$2.10 an hour.

**Ad Week Set Aside**

Governor Smith recently proclaimed the week of February 19-25 as Advertising Recognition Week in Oregon. The week's observance here, under the general sponsorship of the Advertising Association of the West, is part of the nation-wide celebration of National Advertising Week. This will be the sixth annual celebration of the week here.

In signing the proclamation, Governor Smith said, "The power of advertising has long been known, but the benefits of advertising for each one of us are too often unappreciated. It is fitting that we take one week in the year to recognize these benefits."

Jack Fitting, president of the Oregon Advertising Club, who was with Governor Smith when he signed the proclamation, said, "The purpose of this week is expressed in its theme, 'Advertising helps you live better for less.' All activities of the week are planned to help the public understand the essential service advertising provides in giving them information about the products and services they need."

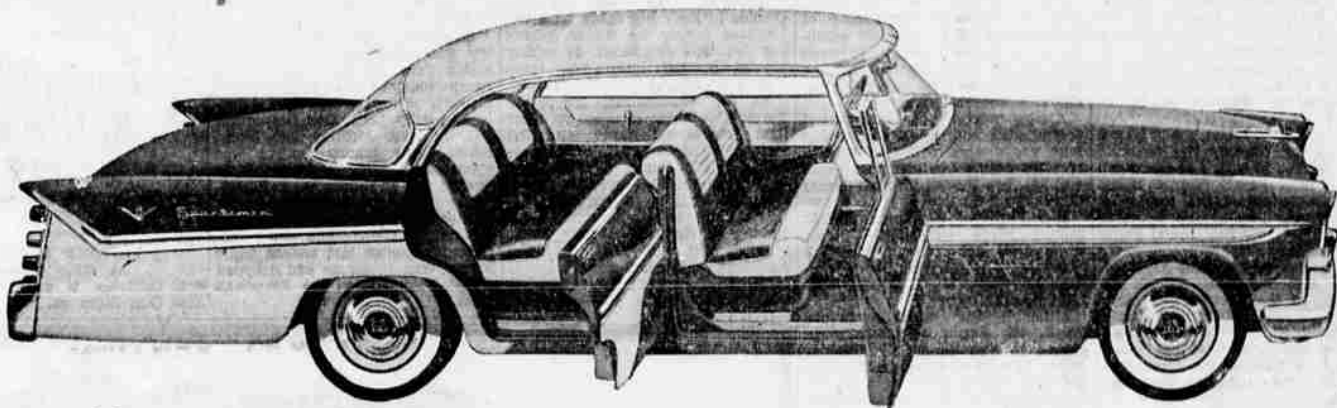
**'Blackouts' Gets Vegas Contract**
