Large Share Of Damaged Jackson County Timber Sold

A progress report issued by John Carnegie, Medford Timber Sale Assistant for the Bureau of Land Management, indicates that a large share of the timber controlled by the bureau that was damaged in the large fires in Jackson County last September has been either sold or readied for sale.

The timber damaged in the Jackson Creek fire near Jacksonville was purchased by Donna Timber Products Company of Medford on February 16. This tract, which contained an estimated 1,614,000 board feet of timber, was purchased in an oral auction sale in which two other bidders participated. The high bid was \$35 per thousand board feet for the Douglas fir, \$39.99 for ponderosa pine, \$39 for sugar pine, \$9 for incense cedar and \$12 for the white fir.

The fire-killed timber in the Blackwell Hill fire, was sold to George Cook of Ashland on February 17 for \$7.50 per thousand for the Douglas fir and \$6 for ponderosa pine. This sale contained an estimated 180,000 board feet.

Olsen-Ross Lumber Company of White City, Lloyd Timber Company of Grants, Pass and DeArmond Brothers Lumber Company of Rogue River have purchased the three tracts offered for sale to date in the Sykes Creek burn. These three tracts contained an estimated 3,007,000 board feet. A fourth tract, containing approximately five million board feet, will probably be advertised for sale in April, leaving approximately 10 million board feet of intermingled fire-killed and green timber yet to be cruised for sales later in the spring.

The first tract, containing an estimated 451,000 board feet, was purchased by Olsen-Ross Lumber Company on January 16 for \$29.15 for Douglas fir, \$22.20 for ponderosa pine, \$19.85 for sugar pine, and \$9.20 for incense cedar.

Lloyd Timber Company purchased the second tract, containing an estimated 2,281,000 board feet, on January 16 for \$30 for Douglas fir, \$25.55 for ponderosa pine, \$21 for sugar pine and \$7 for incense cedar.

DeArmond Brothers Lumber Company purchased the third tract, containing an estimated 275,000 board feet on February 14 for \$24.45 for Douglas fir, \$12.65 for ponderosa pine, \$21.40 for sugar pine and \$3.80 for incense cedar.

As an erosion control measure the bureau seeded 670 acres in these fires to grass last fall, according to Carnegie's report. The present plans call for considerable reforestation work to be done by the bureau and the timber purchasers as logging is completed.

Donna Timber Products Company will be required to plant ponderosa pine seedlings on 78 acres on their sale area and Lloyd Timber Company will also plant ponderosa pine seedlings on 180 acres on their sale area. The bureau itself plans to plant pine seedlings on 40 acres included in the Olsen-Ross Lumber Company sale area, the 129 acres in the DeArmond Brothers Lumber Company area and an additional 100 acres or more in the Jackson Creek fire. All of these areas will be planted with 2-year-old seedlings; it is anticipated that they can be completed by the end of 1956. Tree planting will also be required of the purchasers of the remaining Sykes Creek sales, although these sales will be in areas where damage was less severe and an adequate seed source can be saved to assure natural reforestation on portions of the area.

None of the remaining fire-killed timber will be offered for sale before April. On March 1, two tracts of salvage timber located in Jackson County and containing an estimated 386,000 board feet will be offered for sale and on March 15

BEATTYVILLE, Ky. (AP)—County Judge Cecil Kineaid plans to hold a hearing Saturday on murder charges against William Brandenburg, 12, who admitted shooting his father and brother.

The boy and his 9-year-old sister said Monday he had set fire to their cabin Friday after slaying their father, Brack, 65, and brother, Luther, 18.

The judge quoted the boy as saying he directed his sister to take \$3 and some change from Luther's pocketbook to buy some moonshine whiskey.

Kefauver Ends Campaign Tour

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) ended a four-day Minnesota campaign last night with a call for removal of what he termed the "union-busting provisions of the Taft-Hartley law."

He drew applause from an audience of about 400 at the Minneapolis Labor Temple when he said:

"The Eisenhower administration promised to eliminate certain features of the labor act but the first thing they did was to bring a bill out of a Senate committee with three or four more strike-busting provisions."

He said also that the Eisenhower administration had failed to "keep faith with the people" on the labor law changes as well as on the farm program and foreign policy.

With respect to Secretary of State Dulles, Kefauver said he was "walking around on the brink of war while the people want peace, going up, down and sideways in his foreign policy, everywhere but forward."

If elected president, he said, he would see to it that "labor has the right to bargain collectively, organize and be treated on an even basis with industry and agriculture."

The Tennessee senator is competing with Adlai Stevenson for Democratic delegates in the March 20 presidential primary.
