Graham May Change Plea

DENVER (AP) — A defense attorney said Thursday John Gilbert Graham, 24, accused killer of 44 in an airliner bombing, may drop his plea of innocent by reason of insanity and stand trial on a plea of innocence only.

Charles Vigil, one of three court-appointed defense attorneys, said that "a possibility" that will be reviewed "Friday at a conference with the other defense lawyers, John J. Gibbons and L. Paul Weadick."

Gibbons told newsmen Graham has asked him to draw up a petition for Graham's signature in which he will ask the court to drop his insanity plea.

Graham is scheduled to go on trial March 5 in Denver District Court to determine his sanity last Nov. 1 when a United Air Lines plane was blown up by a dynamite bomb shortly after taking off from the Denver airport.

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
