

Education Follow-Up Meet Opens Tonight At Mills

Whether a sales tax is needed to finance the operation of state affairs — including aid to schools — is expected to prompt considerable discussion at the White House Conference on Education follow-up meeting tonight, according to T. J. O'Hara, Klamath and Lake counties conference chairman.

The follow up meeting is slated for 8 p.m. in Mills School auditorium. The purpose of the meeting is to report what has been accomplished through the White House conferences, and the implication for local school districts in our state.

At regional meetings in Oregon last April and May, one major discussion topic was: How can we finance our schools — build and operate them?

In a report from the state sub-

committee, the following recommendations were made:

1. We favor a sales tax to provide additional financial support for education. Those not favoring a sales tax presented a minority report on the floor of the conference, which was defeated.
2. We do not favor further increase in the state income tax. Those favoring an increase in the state income tax for support of education presented a minority report, which lost.
3. We favor federal aid for school building needs only when there are no federal controls. This is an amended form of the original motion which referred to any kind of federal aid.
4. We recommend that state aid to local school districts be increased, such increase to eventually approximate a maximum of 50 per cent of current operational costs.
5. We recommend further study of reorganization of the several school districts of Oregon under the direction of the interim committee to be established by HJR 19 in order to make better use of the tax dollar and afford better education.
6. Ultimately, the future of public education rests with the voters. O'Hara declared, "Friday evening's meeting has been planned to bring you reports on all phases of the White House Conference, with time allowed for questions from the floor."

Speakers will include Mrs. Victor O'Neill, Klamath Falls, and Eugene Fisher, Oakland, delegates to the national conference; Speaker of the House E. A. Geary, city and county school superintendents Arnold Gralapp and Carrol Howe. The public is urged to attend.
