Cellar Position At Stake

Oregon Technical Institute and Oregon College of Education, the two tail-enders of the Oregon Collegiate Conference, meet tonight and Saturday in a two-game series that will determine the unwanted basement position in the final conference standings. This weekend's series will be the final regular season play for both clubs.

Tip-off time is 8 o'clock for the main game, and 6:15 for the preliminary battle.

Coach Wally Palmberg's cold-riddled Owls from OTI and Dr. Bob Livingston's Wolves from Oregon College will find themselves again battling for the dubious honor that nobody wants, that of finishing last in the five team league. The Owls and Wolves are presently tied for the honor, and by splitting this week's pair of ties, the two clubs would be co-winners.

For the Owls to climb out of the cellar, they will have to subdue their visitors from Monmouth twice. And should the tables be reversed, and OCE capture both games, then the Owls would be the sole holder for the number five spot, while Oregon College would finish in fourth behind Southern Oregon.

TRAVELING
OCE conference action this weekend finds Portland State College, the league's leading quintet, traveling to La Grande for two games with Eastern Oregon College of Education. All the PSC Vikings need to clinch their second straight OCC pennant is to win one of the two games. By losing both to the Mounties, Portland State can do no worse than tie for the league's crown.

In the overall OTI-OCE records on the basketball floor, Tech holds the upper hand with an 11-9 record for the first five seasons of Oregon Collegiate Conference play. So far this year the two clubs are even-up with one win apiece after an earlier season series at Monmouth.

Palmberg's club was ripped by the cold and flu bugs this past week, as three of the OTI front-line cagers were sent to bed to try and shake their illnesses before tonight's series opener. Ted Fischer, John Foster and Bobby Whitman all were hit hard by the winter bugs, but Palmberg said today he thought the threesome would be ready to go tonight, although not at top speed.

STARTING UNIT
Whitman and Fischer are Tech's starting guards, and Foster a forward in the Tech starting unit. John McCutcheon will be a center for the Owls, while Jerry Fasteen will draw the second forward position. If any of the regular starters are unable to move out against the Wolves, Palmberg will probably use Bob Frost, Terry Blair or Paul Hatcher.

Oregon College will probably start the same lineup that knocked off the league-leading Portland State College Vikings twice earlier this year. At the forward posts for the Owls will be Barry Adams and either Ron Jones or Doug Zitek. At center for Oregon College will probably be Wayne "Moose" Young, a 6-3 sophomore from Coos Bay. The backcourt duties will be capably handled by the high-scoring Cece Miller and Daryl Girod, 6-6 transfer from Willamette.

ChiSox Look At Shortstop

Little Luis Aparicio, a big reason why the Chicago White Sox swung that big winter deal for slugger Larry Doby, gets his first chance today to show the Sox they didn't make a mistake.

Because the Sox had stick-fielding Luis coming up from the minors, they were willing to give up a "clans" shortstop in Chica Carrasquel in order to obtain homer-hitting Doby from the Cleveland Indians. A top-notch shortstop is a "must" for a permanent contender, and the Sox think Luis is just that.

Aparicio goes on display at the Sox training camp in Tampa, Fla., today for the first time in an intrasquad game with Manager Marty Marion — the one-time "Mr. Shortstop" — watching closely.

The Sox are confident that Aparicio, a five-foot, nine-inch Venezuelan, will adequately replace fellow Venezuelan Carrasquel as a fielder. They are more concerned with his batting — he had a .278 average last season for Memphis, and led the Southern Assn. in stolen bases with 48.

While the Sox watched a rookie, the world champion Brooklyn Dodgers were cheered by good news from a veteran pitcher — Carl Erskine.

Erskine, only 29 despite 6½ years in the majors, won 20 games in 1953 and 18 in '54, but dropped off to 11 last year with a sore arm. The little right-hander from Anderson, Ind., tested his arm in a workout Thursday and reported "no pain at all." Doctors had advised Erskine that the winter's rest should cure his flinper.

The first St. Louis Cardinal regular pitcher to appear in an intrasquad game was Larry Jackson, and he gave up four runs in one inning on two hits, two walks, and an error Thursday. The Cards' "major league" rookie beat their "minor leaguers," 7-1, in the six-inning game.

At some of the other camps: Rookie pitcher Johnny Peyerba became the Chicago Cubs' first casualty with a sore arm and was ordered not to throw for several days; the Baltimore Orioles trotted out a tackling dummy and the players practiced bowling it over in sliding into second base; and rookie lefty Gene Snyder of the Philadelphia Phillies pitched four no-hit innings in a game at the team's baseball school.

R. Castellani Ring Favorite Over Sullivan

NEW YORK (AP) — Rocky Castellani, who has given up all outside work in a new drive to get a title shot, is a 2-1 favorite to defeat England's John L. Sullivan tonight in a radio-television 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden.

"I've only got two or three years to go in the ring and I might as well concentrate full time on boxing," said the 28-year-old ex-marine from Cleveland. "I've given up my job and from now on it's boxing only for me."

"I only had four fights last year and five the year before and that's not enough action to keep in top form. I want to get another crack at the title—this year if I can—and I'm willing to fight anyone to earn it. That goes for Bobo Olson, Charley Humez, Eduardo Lausse, Milo Savage and Gene Fullmer. The more the merrier."

Castellani, a rangy, broad-shouldered boxer with good legs and a snapping left jab, lost a close decision to Bobo Olson, then the middleweight champion, Aug. 20, 1954. He dropped Ray Robinson in losing another narrow decision July 22.

Sullivan, a standup boxer with a fine left jab, was stopped in five rounds by Lausse and beat Jackie King and Tony Johnson in his latest invasion of the United States. The 23-year-old Briton has a 64-17-3 record with 35 kayos. NBC will broadcast and telecast at 10 p.m. EST.

Iona '5' Upends Terriers

The upset whammy still has its hold on the tournament clubs in college basketball with St. Francis of Brooklyn the latest victim.

The Terriers, who had won 18 straight before being turned under by St. Joseph's of Philadelphia last Saturday, lost their second straight last night in a discouraging 97-86 game against Iona.

Off what they showed against the aroused Gaels, now 8-13, the Terriers may well be the darkest darkhorse in the National Invitation Tournament since Black Beauty.

It was the sixth defeat in 13 games played by NIT and NCAA-bound teams this week. Xavier of Ohio, headed for the NIT, kept the postseason clubs above .500 by putting Eastern Kentucky in its place 95-72. The Kentuckians had stumped another NIT entry, Louisville, by two points, Tuesday.

St. Francis, ranked 16th in the AP poll, never really got rolling against Iona. The Terriers failed to set up a tight defense against the outside sets of Larry Blaney and Ralph Savarese in the first half and never did find out how to stop Joe Bernardi, who wound up with 38 points.

Iona solved the problem of St. Francis' highly regarded sophomore rebounder, Al Innis, simply by drawing him away from the Gaels' board. He collected 19 points, but got only three in the second half before Coach Dan Lynch called him to the bench and kept him there for the last 15 minutes of the game.

Xavier hit 49 per cent of its shots and pulled away from Eastern Kentucky after the first 16 minutes.

Davidson clinched the eighth and final berth for next week's Southern Conference championship tourney by eliminating Virginia Military 79-73 as Semi Mints scored 25 and Hobby Cobbs 22.

Virginia, outshot from the floor, beat Maryland at the free-throw line 29-12 to upset the Terps 73-60 for a sixth-place tie with South Carolina in the final Atlantic Coast standings.

Opinions Formed In Oval Case

NEW YORK (UP)—Two conclusions seem fairly obvious today in the wake of the permanent suspension of Miller Wes Santee.

The first is that the Kansas runner look more in expenses than the amateur law allows. The second is that Santee, doing no more than many others, is a sacrificial offering to the AAU's own guilty conscience.

Santee's mistake was in taking a check instead of cash. You may debate all day that Santee was no more guilty than many others and that his payout was rather trivial, being only \$1,500 in 22 months. But you can't avoid the fact that he did accept excessive payments beyond what the AAU law allows.

The fact that everybody else on the whole is wrong does not make Santee right. Possibly you can feel there is some basis to the charge that somebody is out to "get" him. As the biggest name in track and field he was exceptionally vulnerable. Had the AAU made an "example" out of let's say, somebody in the mile walk, nobody would have paid any particular notice.

BAD RAP
Santee never came out and said that he was being tagged with a bad rap. His attorney, to whom I talked several times, never insisted that Wes was completely innocent.

The major demand was that the case be sent back to Santee's home Missouri Valley Assn. They had cleared him once to 7 vote indicates that even there some of those sitting in judgment weren't completely certain that he hadn't been "on the take" to a certain extent. But Santee's counsel, shooting to have the case sent back for another home town decision, knew it was the only manner in which he could win.

It is ridiculous to insist that being barred as a "professional" would have any bad after effects on the Santee name. Nobody ever thought that such previously disgraced athletes as Jim Thorpe, Paavo Nurmi and Gunder Haag should be in prison because they made a little above expenses and were barred from amateur ranks.

SLIM ACCOUNTS
The bonus is, and should be, on the AAU and on its niggardly, profit-making system which doesn't allow comfortable expense accounts to the men who "make" its track meets.

Colleges have an out on their pinch-penny methods on the theory that their contests are part of the collegiate athletic system. But men such as Santee and other headliners are not collegians being paid off in part with an education. Santee is a Marine lieutenant. Horace Ashenfelter is an FBI man. Bob Richards is a teacher. And so it goes.

When they give up personal time for training and take long periods away from their families and work to compete in meets which are strictly money-makers for the organizations putting them on they should be allowed a fair return. True, they aren't professionals. But their expense accounts should be equitable and comfortable.

Actually, this is accepted even by the AAU. But their method is one of under-the-table. Santee's big mistake was in taking a check instead of demanding cash as the rest do. He was, in the end, a victim of the system.

CENTRAL POINT (Special) — An all-Jackson County final is assured in the "Little Six" District A-2 basketball tournament being held here this weekend at Crater High School.

In the first opening round game, Henley, the lone entry from Klamath County, dropped from the championship race by falling, 47-35, to Eagle Point. The other Thursday night game between Illinois Valley and Brookings went to Illinois Valley, 51-42.

Tonight, Eagle Point meets Phoenix, the tournament favorite, while the host team Crater tangles with Illinois Valley. Game time for the two battles is 7 o'clock and 8:30.

Henley will meet Brookings in the first game of Saturday night's action, starting at 8:30 for the tourney's fifth spot. Other Saturday games will find the losers of tonight's games playing at 8 o'clock and the winners of this evening's two frays clashing at 9:30.

Henley jumped to a quick 3-0 lead in the opening minutes of the first period, and at the close of the canto, the Hornets led, 9-3.

The halftime margin also favored the Klamath County A-2 club, 18-16, but the tide turned in the third stanza as Henley fell behind. A push shot by Jack Greb with 5:20 left in the quarter gave Eagle Point, a 24-22 heading, one that Henley could never quite reach.

The game was close throughout all of the first three periods as the lead changed hands seven times and was hunted on four other occasions. The widest spread of the game was the 12-point difference in the final scoreboard figures.

Greb led the scoring with 20 points, while Henley's Dale Searcy accounted for 19 to lead his club. Ron Veach added 13 for Eagle Point's winning cause.
