

Valentine Theme Chosen By Ruby Gehring, Bride of Charles Thomas Schubert

The Valentine theme chosen by Ruby May Gehring for her wedding Sunday, February 12, to Charles Thomas (Tom) Schubert, was inspired by his birthday anniversary, February 14.

The Rev. Kent Spaulding read the 2:30 p.m. service in Klamath Lutheran Church in the presence of a large gathering of local and out-of-town relatives and friends.

Ruby is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred J. Gehring, formerly of Klamath Falls, now living in Eureka; and Tom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Schubert, 2577 Bissbee. Both families are well known throughout the Klamath Basin.

Escorted to the altar by her brother, Lou Gehring, Klamath Falls, who gave her in marriage, the bride wore a gown of white nylon tulle and lace over taffeta. The softly molded bodice of lace was made with long pointed sleeves, and the modified low oval neckline was bordered with lace medallions applied on net.
