# Indians Warned; NY Brass Shaken

Manager Al Lopez of the Cleveland Indians apparently has decided to give his team the "shake well" treatment in an effort to head off the New York Yankees in the American League pennant chase.  
He met with his club today in its Tucson, Ariz., camp and announced that Al Smith was the only player on hand who was certain of the job.  
"And he doesn't have a set position," added Lopez. Smith, named the Player of the Year by the Cleveland baseball writers last season, played six positions in 1955.  
"The young fellows have just as much chance as anyone else of winning a place on the team," said Lopez. "One hustling young player sometimes can give the whole club a lift."  
Meanwhile, the Yanks were having their troubles with holdouts. On their first day of spring training, they were faced with the problem of bringing half a dozen top pitchers into line. This is an unprecedented situation and it has the Bomber brass worried.  
Ace Whitey Ford and the club still are \$5,000 apart. He wants \$30,000 and has been offered \$25,000. Other holdouts are Tom Morgan, Bob Grim, Jim Konstanty, Don Larsen and Mickey McDermott.

Guard Ted Schadevits again led the victors, scoring 30 points. Ken Westenskow and Lowell Kolbaha added 21 each, a total also reached by Portland State's Paul Poetsch.  
Oregon Tech again dominated last-place Oregon College of Education in a game at Klamath Falls, 84-61. Oregon Tech's zone defense again stopped the visitors, and Oregon Tech cut off to an overwhelming lead. At the half it was 49-20, and reserves played much of the final period for the "Techmen."

## NC State Loses Star; OSU Topples Illinois

A broken wrist, a defensive paradox, an old-fashioned shellacking and an upset have turned college basketball topsy-turvy as it enters its last full week in the regular season.  
The broken wrist, suffered by North Carolina State's Ron Shavlik, unrocked State as favorite to win its third straight Atlantic Coast title. The conference championship now is up for grabs among State, North Carolina, Wake Forest and Duke in the three-day tournament opening Thursday with the winner going to the NCAA.  
The defensive paradox turned the Big Ten race into a tortoise-and-hare drama. Iowa finally caught Illinois just before their showdown at Iowa City Saturday. The Illini, who had held Ohio State's Robin Freeman to 12 points while running up 16 straight victories, fell into a tie with Iowa (10-1) when they couldn't even hold Freeman to 30.  
Robin scored 43 and Ohio State won by three, 87-84.  
SHELLACKING  
The shellacking was applied by Alabama and capped the revolt against Kentucky's 11-year reign in the Southeastern Conference. Alabama mauled the Wildcats 101-77. With three games remaining, it can clinch at least a share of its first title since 1934 by beating Tennessee tonight.  
Kentucky, as runner-up, is the likely SEC entry in the NCAA, however, since Bama's first five are four-year men and are ineligible.

## Crown Taken By Canadiens

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Montreal Canadiens breezed to the National Hockey League championship when they set out to add the Stanley Cup playoff crown to their laurels.  
That's the considered opinion of Coach Jim Skinner, whose Detroit Red Wings' seven-year reign as NHL champions officially ended Saturday night with a 5-1 loss to the powerful Canadiens. The Canadiens won the Stanley Cup in 1953 but won their last league crown in 1946-47.  
"The Canadiens aren't going to win the Stanley Cup easily and neither is anybody else," Skinner said. "There are no pushovers in the league this year as there have been in other years. Just for example, we've had just as much trouble with the Rangers this year as with the Canadiens."
