## Bird Hunters Enjoy Good 1955 Season

Waterfowl hunters enjoyed an excellent season this past year on the three public shooting grounds operated by the Oregon Game Commission according to final figures compiled at Sausalito, Calif., Summer Lake, and Warner Valley.

Total figures show that 15,209 hunters used the areas harvesting 36,228 waterfowl of all species. Of this number 25,767 were ducks and 10,461 were geese. The success ratio was 2.38 birds per hunter, which was the highest success ratio ever recorded on the public shooting areas.

The best shooting was had at Summer Lake where 6,342 hunters took 9,484 ducks and 9,407 geese for a total of 18,891 birds and a success ratio of 2.98 birds per hunter. As in the past, mallards were most prevalent in the duck kill while snow geese dominated the harvest of geese.

Despite flood conditions which existed almost the entire last half of the season, the hunter kill on Sausalito Island exceeded that of previous years. A total of 8,297 hunters took 15,438 birds of which 16,191 were ducks and 247 were geese. The success ratio was 1.98 birds per hunter. Baldpate again predominated in the bag with mallards, pintail, and green-winged teal following in order.

In the main, Warner Valley was a disappointment to hunters because of clear weather and lack

## Activation Ceremonies Of New Army Reserve Unit Set

Activation ceremonies for the new Army Reserve Company which has been set up in Klamath Falls will be held Wednesday evening at the Army Reserve Center in the Willis Building, 433 Main Street.

The ceremony, open to the public, will begin at 8 p.m. Reservists, both members of the new company and of older companies, are asked to be at the center by 7:45 p.m.

The new company, the 733rd Engineer Aviation Depot Company, will be commanded by Captain John P. Burke of Tulelake. Burke was the main organizer of the new company, and has commanded similar units while on active duty.

Guest speakers at the activation ceremony will be Colonel Robert C. White of Vancouver Barracks, Washington, senior Army adviser for the Oregon Military District; Army Reserve Colonel William H. Prentice of Medford, commander of the 11th Engineer Aviation Brigade, to which the new company is attached, and Mayor Paul O. Landry of Klamath Falls.

Major Jay M. Hamilton of Medford, unit adviser, will present the new company with its guidon. The master of ceremonies will be Captain Rex Davis of Klamath Falls, a member of the 6402nd Logistical Command, another Klamath Falls reserve unit.

Following the ceremony, all of the reserve units will conduct regular training. The training sessions will also be open to the public. Burke said the mission of the company, if it were to be called into active duty, would be to operate a depot for the supplies needed to construct airports. The company, however, would conduct no construction operations.

In addition to company administration, members of the company will take training in basic military subjects, and supply and warehouse operating and accounting procedures.

There are many vacancies in the company for enlisted men, whether or not they have had past military experience. There are also several vacancies for officers and warrant officers.

The company is one of the three Reserve units operating in Klamath Falls. The other two are Company G, 311th Military Police Battalion, commanded by Captain Walter M. Risse of Langell Valley, and the 6402nd Logistical Command, commanded by Colonel Albert V. McVey, instructor at Oregon Technical Institute.

Members of all units except the 6402nd are paid one full day's pay for each meeting they attend, and attend an annual 17-day summer camp, during which they receive full pay and allowances. The new company, however, will not attend summer camp this year.

Prospective recruits are invited to attend meetings of these units, which are held at 8 p.m. Mondays at the Reserve Center. Further information may be obtained from Sfc. H. C. Collier, unit adviser, telephone 4799.
