

P-I Reports UW Hires New Coach

SEATTLE (AP) — Darrell Royal of Mississippi State College was named new University of Washington football coach Tuesday.

Athletic Director George Briggs announced the selection of the 31-year-old former University of Oklahoma quarterback at a news conference.

SEATTLE (AP) — The University of Washington has tagged Darrell Royal, head football coach at Mississippi State in 1954-55, to replace the fired Johnny Cherberg. The Post-Intelligencer reported Tuesday.

The newspaper said George Briggs, Washington's new athletic director, is expected to make an early announcement—possibly Tuesday—of the appointment of the new coach.

Briggs declined comment on the report. But the P-I said it had learned from other sources the athletic director flew east over the weekend for a huddle with Royal and reported back Monday to the Washington Faculty Athletic Committee.

"Since Briggs had said previously he would meet with the committee when he had his plans ready, it is logical to believe

that he gave them the name of the coach and the new coach's terms," The Post-Intelligencer said.

Royal, 31, a split-T quarterback for Bud Wilkinson's Oklahoma Sooners in 1949, entered the coaching field as an assistant at Tulsa in 1950. He moved to Mississippi State in 1952 to install the split-T for Murray Warmath, and in 1953 signed as coach at Edinboro in the Canadian professional football league. Royal introduced the split-T to Canadian football in his year at Edinboro. He won two exhibitions, 12 of 16 in the regular schedule, but lost the best-of-three Western final, 21, to Winnipeg.

In 1954, he became head coach at Mississippi State replacing Warmath, who moved to Minnesota. He had identical 6-4 records in two years at Mississippi State.

It sized by Washington, Royal would succeed Cherberg who was fired Jan. 27 after a lengthy controversy that followed a "rebellion" last fall by some players who protested what they said were Cherberg's "tyrannical" coaching methods.

Harvey Cassill resigned as athletic director after handing Cherberg his walking papers and was replaced early this month by Briggs, who had been assistant athletic director at California.

Niemi Quits Pro Football

SPOKANE (AP) — Laurie Niemi, husky bulwark of the Washington Redskins and the Vancouver Lions football teams, today said he was going to give up professional football and turn to coaching.

Niemi, former All-American from Washington State, said at his home in Clarkston, Wash., that he had received "a very fine offer" to go into coaching.

He declined to give the name of the school he will report to, and said he felt the announcement would come from the "other end."

"I'm not as young as I used to be," Niemi said. He added that the coaching offer was "too good to turn down."

"I feel this is as fine a starting chance as I'll have," Niemi said.

Niemi was offered a 1956 contract by Clem Crowe, coach of the Vancouver Lions, but he turned it down.

Corvallis '5' Snares Berth
CORVALLIS (AP) — A driving lay-up shot by forward Ray Lundie with 23 seconds left gave Corvallis a 46-44 victory over Albany Monday night and a berth in the class A district 8 basketball tournament next Friday and Saturday.

Host South Salem will meet Bend in one game Friday and Corvallis goes against North Salem in the other. The first night winners will enter the state tournament next month. The losers will meet Saturday to determine which will enter a playoff with a district team for a tournament berth.

Pettit Opens Scoring Lead
NEW YORK (UP) — Bob Pettit, the St. Louis Hawks' 6-foot, 9-inch scoring machine, opened up a 78-point lead in the National Basketball Association's individual scoring race today and also seemed certain to win the circuit's rebounding title.

Pettit tallied 213 points in seven games, including 23 in a losing cause against the New York Knicks' Erskine Gentry Monday night, to raise his season total to 1,549 points in 61 games — an average of 25.4 a game. Paul Arizin of the Philadelphia Warriors ranks second with 1,471 points with teammate Neil Johnston, 1954-55 scoring champion, third with 1,396 points.

The league's official statistics also revealed that Pettit leads with 986 rebounds to 969 by Rochester's Maurice Stokes and 833 by Minneapolis' Clyde Lovellette.

Johnston leads in field goal accuracy with .460. Boston's Bill Sharman in free throw accuracy with .860 and Boston's Bob Cousy in assists with 541.

OSAA Announces B Cage Pairings

Winter Claiming Deer Herd

SEATTLE (AP) — From 40-50,000 deer will die in five central Washington counties this year from the effects of the bitter winter cold and snow.

John A. Briggs, state director of game, makes the estimate and says the loss is a certainty in spite of the department's all-out efforts to save the deer.

The total is around half the 80-90,000 killed by hunters in the entire state in the record season of 1935. It is far greater than the kill by hunters in any year prior to 1945, when the state began permitting the shooting of does as well as antlered bucks.

"No doubt we will have to go back to the buck-only regulations in the hard-hit counties," Briggs says. These are Chelan, Okanogan, Kittitas, Yakima and Ferry.

Harvesting of deer in the Okanogan-Chelan district last year and the total probably will be eclipsed there by the toll of winter.

DAMAGE
Pushed down from the hills by the snow, the deer browse on the fruit tree twigs. Worried orchardists, knowing their trees were hard hit also by winter damage and mice, "have in the most part been extremely tolerant and helpful," says the director.

One orchardist has killed 111 deer, says Briggs, under the state law which permits the protection of property against marauding wildlife. But generally there has been very little of such killing, the director reports.

"The deer have had no place to go," he continues. "There was no place for them near the town of Twisp, for example. Only the tops of the fruit trees were showing. We feed as many deer as we can and hope they will pull through."

But the feeding does not take the place of the deer's natural food. "Browse" of the hills. Many of the deer will survive the worst of the winter, only to succumb once spring returns and turns the hillsides green.

WEAKENED
"They come out of the winter in an extremely weakened condition and seem unable to regain their health," says Briggs.

Seventy feeding stations have been operating in the two most critically affected counties, Chelan and Okanogan. Game department crews in night-long vigils herd deer away from some 65 orchards toward the stations. There the deer are fed hay and the newly developed—and extremely expensive—nutritional pellet.

"Our costs easily will be \$100,000 above that of an ordinary winter," the director says, "without including damage claims which may be filed against the state later by orchardists."

While the deer have suffered, the state's elk have enjoyed the winter. Feeding stations in the Yakima Valley, Briggs says, are busy with more than 4,000 hay-loving elk. Ring-necked pheasants also have wintered well, but the chukar partridge and quail coveys have suffered heavily.

Frick Denies That Majors Home Looking

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Cities that want big league baseball are going to have to come to the majors, Commissioner Ford Frick believes, because "the majors aren't going to come to them."

The occasional rumors about big league teams hunting for new homes because of financial troubles are "silly," the commissioner said.

"There are 16 sound organizations in the majors now. None is financially weak," he said.

It cities think they're ready for major league status, he advised, "it's up to those cities to go after the franchises."

Frick, here on a visit that will take him to four major league spring training camps in Arizona, noted that there have been several major league franchise shifts in the past few years. But he said he thinks the moving is over, at least for the time being.

If new cities are to get into the majors, he said, it probably will be through the creation of new franchises. When this will occur he doesn't know, and he doesn't want to guess.

No Vacancy In Flatbush . . . Parking Problems Hurt Dodgers

The Brooklyn baseball fan is a different breed these days. He is not the under-shirt-wearing, loud-screaming guy in the centerfield bleachers who throws notes to the players with precious strategy written on them.

Nor does he attack umpires physically, jump on the field to congratulate his particular hero and carry big signs calling so-and-so on the opposition a lemon-headed bum.

The Brooklyn baseball fan today is a fellow living in a well-maintained six-room house at Hempstead or Bay Shore, out on Long Island. When the Dodgers are to play each night, he flicks the dial on his television set.

Nobody realizes this more than Walter O'Malley, who owns the Dodgers. That's why he's making all this noise for a new ballpark in Brooklyn, you see, from its border-

ough-hall sector to Ebbets Field's outmoded grandstands, is a defenseless victim of the modern-day move to the suburbs and more comfort.

TROLLEY CAR
The Dodger fan used to hop onto the trolley car and for five cents he was at the park. O'Malley says, "Today he has a car. But he knows he can't park it at our park. So he stays home."

"Television is not the reason for our troubles," O'Malley says. "It is parking. Why if I had a ballpark which could park 14,000 cars I would make people forget there is a Milwaukee. We would draw three million customers. And our games would be on television, too."

This is O'Malley's answer to the feeling that Brooklyn is a cinch to be in, say, Los Angeles or San Francisco some time soon.

"Why would you leave this huge market?" he asks. "We have a few million people around here. In Brooklyn, you see, from its bor-

der to the city limits, there used to be, for example, four healthy daily newspapers in Brooklyn. Today, there is none. Shopping has fallen. With this, O'Malley did a little shopping of his own. He has the Brooks in Jersey City for seven games. The idea is, of course, to attract Jersey clientele to Ebbets Field.

Kaline Takes On Poundage

It develops that Al Kaline was just a growing boy in 1955 when he won the American League batting championship.

Most batting champions are content to let well enough alone but the 21-year-old outfielder surprised his Detroit Tiger teammates Monday when he checked into camp at a robust 186 pounds. That represented a gain of 19 pounds over the weight at which he closed the 1955 campaign.

But Kaline's teammates and Manager Bucky Harris agreed the new poundage looked good on the youngest batting champion in major league history.

"It should make it easier for him to reach fences, that he just missed last year," said Harris. "He's out of the slumps. Some extra pounds won't hurt."

Kaline led the circuit with a .340 average last season, hit 27 home runs and knocked in 102 runs in 152 games.

COMEBACK
At Clearwater, Fla., meanwhile, the Philadelphia Phillies put the stamp of approval on the first phase of infielder Granny Hamner's comeback when they signed him to a contract estimated at \$23,000. The Phillies refused to talk terms with Hamner until he proved his injured legs were strong again — a matter which Hamner took care of the last two weeks. The Phillies are still waiting for Curt Simmons to prove his arm is sound before they discuss terms with the one-time \$65,000 bonus whiff.

The Brooklyn Dodgers sold left-handed pitcher Tom Lasorda from their Montreal farm club to Kansas City for an undisclosed sum and a minor league player to be selected at a future date. Lasorda had a 9-8 record and a 3.27 earned run average in the International League last year.

Outfielders Hank Aaron and Bill Bruton signed with the Milwaukee Braves leaving only pitcher Ray Crone, outfielders Andy Pafko and West Covington and infielders Jack Dittmer and George Crowe unsatisfied.

Jim Wilson, a 12-game winner for the seventh-place Baltimore Orioles last season, makes his spring debut today in an intra-squad game.

Manager Charley Dressen of the Washington Senators tabbed rookie John Valmas as "a real find" after the 23-year-old right-hander impressed during batting practice. Valmas was 23-11 with the Class D Orlando Flyers in 1955.

Pitcher Mel Parnell signed with the Boston Red Sox leaving General Manager Joe Cronin free to give his undivided attention to first baseman Norm Zaichis.

Jack Brzandt, International League "rookie of the year" with Rochester last season, began his conversion from the outfield to shortstop and drew praise from both General Manager Frank Lane and Manager Fred Hutchinson.

Moore Quick In Ring Win

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UP) — World light heavyweight champion Archie Moore said today he put heavyweight Bob Dunlap out of action in a hurry to prove he isn't getting to be an old man.

Moore, looking faster, a bit tougher than during his dull win over Howard King in San Francisco, last night knocked out Dunlap, an Oakland, Calif., 200-pounder, in 1:56 of the first round of a non-title bout. It took Moore only a few punches to prove he's still rugged.

"The reason I knocked him out so fast was because I've been getting a lot of criticism about slowing up," Moore said. "When the opening bell rang, I was out for a knockout."

The champion said he has been irked by reports saying his reflexes are slowing up.

"They said I'm slow, but they're wrong," he said. "I didn't fool around. After all, if you fool around with a guy, you're through."

Moore, 196, caught his opponent with a hard left to the body and then a right cross to the chin to deck Dunlap. Dunlap was up on one knee when he was counted out by referee Frank Rustich.

During his brief appearance in the ring, Dunlap showed nothing but respect for the San Diego fighter. He failed to land a blow that bothered the champion.

It was Moore's second win over Dunlap. The champion kayoed him in the sixth round of their 1952 San Francisco match. Last night's fight was Moore's second since world heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano knocked him out in New York last year.

Word Goes Out That Dons To Shoot Works

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The word was out Tuesday to the future foes of the unbeaten basketball Dons of San Francisco: Look for the full treatment.

The Dons go after their 46th successive triumph—and with it the California Basketball Assn. championship and an automatic National Collegiate Athletic Assn. tournament bid—Tuesday night against College of the Pacific, a

team they've already beaten by 17 points.

Coach Phil Woolpert is on record with the statement that he plans to use his regulars steadily in the final week of the regular season. "We can't get any scrimmage among ourselves because we drop off so abruptly behind the first team," he said Monday at a basketball writers' luncheon. "I have to let the regulars play to keep them in shape and I'm not taking any chances on staleness with the tournament coming up."

All season long, while the Dons have been winning 21 straight games, Woolpert has substituted freely as soon as his regulars have run up a substantial lead.

Bill Russell, his All-American has played the full 40 minutes only twice. The other starters—forward Mike Farmer and Carl Boldt and guards K. C. (Casey) Jones and Hal Perry—have spent equally as much time on the bench.

"They're always looking over to the bench, thinking they're going to come out," said Woolpert. "I've got to keep them in shape the way of the way."

The Dons' expected triumph Tuesday night will assure them of the CBA title and the chance to open defense of their NCAA title in the first round of the tournament at Corvallis, Ore., March 16 against the Pacific Coast Conference champion.
