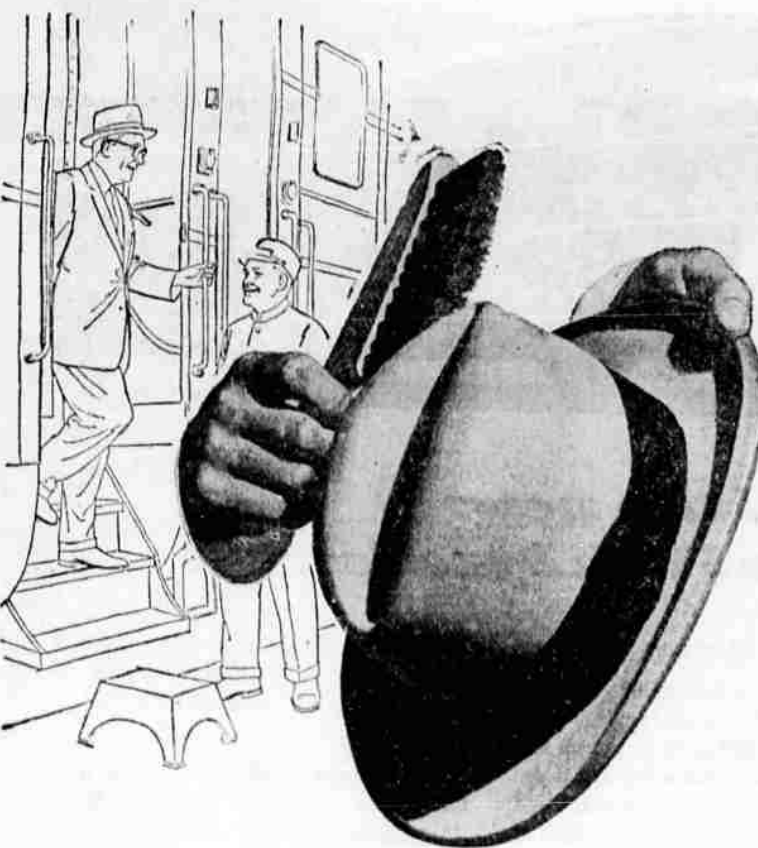

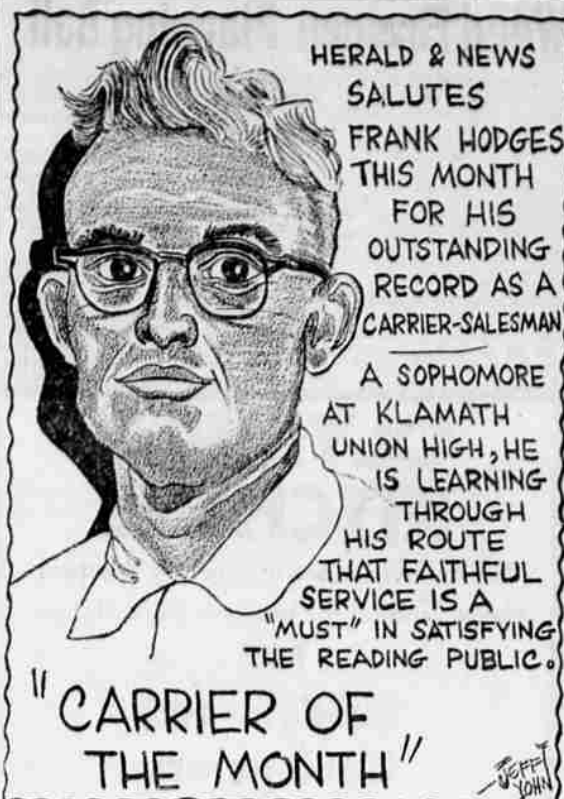

HOME EXTENSION
Program Planning Day

A group of representatives from 15 units met Tuesday, February 21, at 10:30 a.m. at Joan's Kitchen. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss next year's program and to have a better understanding of the purpose of program planning.

Mrs. Frank Peyton, county committee chairman, called the meeting to order. Mrs. James Dixon introduced the other committee members present: Mrs. Laue Smith, registration; Mrs. W. H. Bickers, luncheon and Mary McConnell, county 4-H agent. Hope Holbrook presented the guest speakers, Betty Jane Sedgwick and Clifford E. Smith state extension agents from Corvallis.

Mrs. Sedgwick spoke on tying the family together through interest in each other's activities such as 4-H groups for children, home extension for women and agricultural groups for men, each teaching economy and leadership. The

program planning leader, her responsibility to help people understand this.

Smith outlined the objectives of extension work from the state level which ties in with the county work to stimulate leadership, conserve, protect and develop natural resources, coordinate activities of agencies and organizations in working out county problems and to encourage closer rural-urban cooperation and improve farm living.

Walt Jendzejewski, county agriculture agent, pointed out the importance of agriculture to everyone, both politically and economically and not just to those directly involved. He also discussed the proposed "Soil Bank" and its relationship to the agricultural problem created by competition and surplus.

The objective is to reach all homemakers and not just extension members through such mediums as newspapers, workshops, and special meetings and programs. Luncheon was served by the county committee members, after which the discussion was continued.

The afternoon was spent in explanation of the proposed program and a program selected to be voted on by each unit member at a later date.

Dr. Alcorn Named Top In Service

TULELAKE—Dr. George B. Alcorn, has become director of the statewide University of California Agricultural Extension Service. His appointment becomes effective March 1.

This means overall direction of county farm and home advisers, state specialists and other administrative and assisting personnel, reports Ken Baggett, Tulelake Farm Adviser.

A veteran of eight years service as extension economist with headquarters at Berkeley, Alcorn has appeared at meetings and conferences throughout the state. He is well known by livestock, crop and fruit growers. He has appeared before many audiences in Tulelake, Baggett stated and is widely known by Tulelake Basin farmers.

Alcorn, age 45, takes the position held by J. Earl Coke until his resignation last summer. He has two degrees from the University of California and a doctorate from Harvard University in public administration in 1935.

He has served on national and regional committees dealing with farm economics. At present he is a member of the national committee on agricultural policies of the Farm Foundation. He is also an assistant with the U.S. Department of Agriculture on special projects and at present is chairman of the agricultural section of the Commonwealth Club. He is also a member of the American and Western Farm Economics Association.

In announcing the appointment, H. R. Wellman, University vice president, Agricultural Sciences, expressed his confidence in Alcorn and his opinion that under such a leadership, the extension service would maintain its high position in the nation.

Senator Harley Kilgore Of West Virginia Dies

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Sen. Harley Martin Kilgore, the first West Virginian ever elected to three successive terms to the U.S. Senate, died early today.

Death came at 2:23 a.m. to the 63-year-old Democrat at Bethesda Naval Hospital.

He became seriously ill Feb. 25 when he suffered "a minor stroke" at the hospital. He had gone there 12 days before for a physical checkup and treatment for high blood pressure.

Prior to the stroke he had responded favorably to treatment and had expected to leave the hospital within a few days.

Harold C. Miller, Kilgore's administrative assistant, said the senator suffered another cerebral hemorrhage early this morning and died soon afterward. He had been in a semi-coma for most of the past two days, Miller said, and was unconscious at the time of death.

Mrs. Lois Kilgore, his wife, a son, Robert, and a daughter, Mrs. Albert T. Young Jr., visited the senator yesterday evening.

Miller said doctors at the hospital attributed death to a stroke stemming from high blood pressure.

With Kilgore's death, the Democratic majority in the Senate was reduced to one seat, 48-47. The West Virginian was the first senator to die in this session of Congress.

Kilgore, who was born Jan. 11, 1893, at Brown, Harrison County, W. Va., was first elected to the Senate in 1940. He defeated the late Sen. Rush Holt, "the boy wonder" senator, in the Democratic primary and Thomas Sweeney, Republican, in the general election.

He was reelected in 1946, again defeating Sweeney.

In 1952, he won his third successive term by defeating former Sen. Chapman Revercomb, Republican.

Kilgore was serving as chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee and as a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee at the time of his death.

During 1941, he became closely associated with former President Truman, then serving in the Senate. After Truman became president,
