

Dunsmuir Citizens Get Assurance

DUNSMUIR—Assurance of recompense for flood damage was given Dunsmuir today by the regional civil defense office in Redding.

Mayor Fred Lloyd reported that the city's application for \$3,623 for repair of washed out portions of River Avenue and lower Buttery Avenue has been approved, according to a phone call from the civil defense office on Monday.

Rex Riley, civil defense coordinator, also told the mayor by phone that the U.S. Army engineers are planning on restoring the sewer plant very destroyed by flood waters and removing the sand bar which now deflects the Sacramento River current in North Dunsmuir.

A second application for emergency flood repair funds for restoration of settling ponds at the sewer plant is still pending approval.

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Urban, Suburban Problems To Be Heard By Committee

A public hearing on questions of local government and fringe area services will be held in Klamath Falls Friday in Mills School auditorium at 7:30 p.m., announced Ormond R. Bean, Portland city commissioner and chairman of the Interim Committee on Local Government, today.

This open hearing will be of special interest to many groups and individuals living in Klamath County who are facing individual problems brought about by the rapid expansion of communities, Bean said.

This is one of a series of public hearings being held over the state designed to get directly from citizens more information about specific problems and data which might aid in analysis and suggestions for possible solutions. The committee has extended invitations to all interested groups and individuals in the county.

COMMITTEE URGES

The committee especially urges representatives of small community groups and local public service district organizations such as water, street lighting, fire protection and others to participate in the hearing. Among specific questions which the committee hopes to have discussed are:

1. Methods by which such services as sewage disposal, water, fire and police protection, public transportation, parks and recreation, road construction and maintenance can best be provided and financed in unincorporated urban areas and in growing cities.
2. State annexation and incorporation laws and procedures.
3. Local government organization.

Members of the committee include: City Commissioner Ormond R. Bean of Portland, chairman; Senator Paul E. Geddes, Roseburg; Senator Stewart Hardie, Condon; Representative V. Edwin Johnson, Eugene; Representative George Layman, Newberg; Representative Al Loucks, Salem; County Judge Raymond A. Lathrop, Grants Pass; Curtis M. Everett, Portland; and John P. Misko, Oregon City.
