This week as I look at the new books on my desk I find several that I think would interest you. A few years ago Ruth Painter Randall wrote "Mary Lincoln, Biography of a Marriage." This was a very interesting book on that controversial wife of our 16th president. She has written a new book, "Lincoln's Sons." Mrs. Randall has had access to much new Lincoln material, particularly the Lincoln papers which were made available to scholars by the Library of Congress 25 years after Robert Lincoln's death. We have read so much about Lincoln himself that it is most interesting to know more about his family. These two books are historically accurate.

Compact Board Makes Stand

SACRAMENTO (UP) — The California Interstate Compact Commission instructed its representatives in Washington late Tuesday to protect California rights in the Washoe water project.

Members of the Nevada Interstate Compact Commission, which operates jointly with the California group, immediately replied that the move would "in effect, kill" the bill authorizing the project. State Engineer Harvey O. Banks wired Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.) earlier asking that the Washoe Project not be operated for other than flood control purposes until an interstate compact has been negotiated to protect California's interests.

In yesterday's action, the California commission backed Banks with a resolution asking that the project's operations be subject to a two-state agreement not yet written.

The project involves the Carson and Truckee rivers which originate in California and flow into Nevada. The California commission charged that most of the benefits accrue to Nevada and the bills in Congress for the Washoe Project contain no protection of California's interest in the water.

A spokesman for the California group said the Bureau of Reclamation cannot build the Washoe Project in four years and that certainly a two-state agreement could be written to govern the project in that time.

THEATERS BURN

KUSHIRO, Japan (AP) — A pre-dawn fire swept through a congested amusement area Wednesday, leveling three theaters and 15 other buildings. One body was recovered and one person was missing. Three others who jumped from flaming roofs were hospitalized.

No Statement Given By Ike

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower did not issue a prepared statement on his second term announcement. The following accurately reflects what he said but is carried in the third person because of White House rules prohibiting direct quotation without special permission.

He has reached a decision. But he found so many factors involved that he saw his answer could not be expressed in simple terms of yes or no. He felt that a full explanation to the American people was necessary. He would never consent to go before the people unless he was sure they understood all the factors and possibilities. He would not allow his name to go before the Republican Convention unless they knew all the facts so they could be sure they were not nominating someone other than they thought.

He could not say flatly that he would run because he does not know for certain that the Republican Convention would want him.

He is asking for time on radio and television networks tonight to go directly to the American people with the facts.

His answer within these limits which he will explain tonight, will be positive, that is, affirmative.

Because he will give full details of his decision tonight, he did not intend to have it as a subject for further discussion at this morning's news conference.

POLICE CONFUSED LAWRENCEBURG, Ky. (AP)—Police were confused when Mrs. Melvin Torstrik reported an intruder had broken out of her house, but she meant it. While upstairs, she heard a noise from the first floor. She called but got no answer. She checked, found no one, locked the front and back doors and returned upstairs. Then came a crash. The intruder had fled but the front door had been broken open.

Former PNW Radio Owner Dies

MERCED, Calif. (UP)—Charles Owen Chatterton, co-owner of radio station KYOS and former Pacific Northwest radio and news figure, died Tuesday of a heart ailment. He was 64. Chatterton came here two years ago from his home in Longview, Wash. Previously he was manager of radio station KGW, when it was owned by the Portland Oregonian, and assistant manager of the Oregonian.

He is survived by his widow, Florence; two daughters, Betty Chatterton of Merced and Mrs. G. C. Fletcher, Longview, and two brothers Paul and John H. Chatterton, both of Portland. Funeral services will be held in Portland.

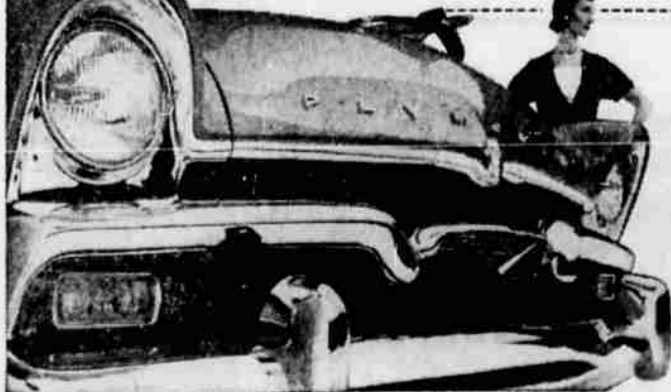
