Local Concert Association Picks Tentative Program

Following reports of a sold out membership, the Klamath Community Concert Association board Thursday night selected a tentative program of four concerts to present during the 1956-57 season. Final selection is contingent upon confirmation by the artists of the dates specified.

The association selected pianist Rudolf Pirkuszy, soloist with the New York Philharmonic Symphony and the Philadelphia Orchestra, to be presented in late fall; the Tanglewood Opera Quartet, who will present a program of arias from favorite operas probably in mid-January and the St. Louis Sinfonietta, a string ensemble slated for late spring.

Previously the association had taken a hold on the Chicago Opera Ballet, a company of 45 including the internationally famous stars Marjorie Talchoff and George Skibine in original ballets "The Merry Widow" and "Reverence" (based on the opera "Il Trovatore"). The entire company includes an orchestra of about 12, the ballet group and several soloists. The Chicago Opera Ballet is tentatively scheduled for presentation in March.

Two programs remain in this year's season. The Song Masters, a vocal quartet, will be presented in concert on Wednesday, March 21, and Carol Smith, contralto, on April 11.

This year's drive for new members lasted only four days—from Monday through Thursday—and was conducted by some 60 volunteer workers headed by Andrew Loney Jr., board president; Mrs. F. C. Adams, secretary; Mrs. Lyle Kellstrom, membership chairman and Jerry Slusser, assistant membership chairman.

Present at the concert selection meeting Thursday at the Winema Hotel was Lucille Schreiner, New York representative of the Community Concerts, Inc.

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GOP Focuses Sights On Congress

By DOUGLAS B. CORNELL WASHINGTON (AP)—Republicans confident of winning with President Eisenhower focused their strategy for 1956 today on sweeping congressional candidates to victory with him.

The strategy looks a little into the future, beyond the current two-party sparring over Eisenhower's second-term bid and his health, and beyond current Republican uncertainty over a vice presidential nominee.

The GOP campaign planning will crystallize in more detailed form at a party powwow of members of the national committee, state chairmen and Republican Senate and House members. Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall says it will be called soon, probably in Washington.

Such a session is bound to produce more talk about whether Vice President Nixon should again be second man on the GOP ticket. Hall forecast it will again be Eisenhower and Nixon. So did Sen. Knowland of California, a political rival of the vice president in their home state.

Announcing his own availability, Eisenhower declined to say Wednesday whether he wants Nixon as a running mate. He said he will wait to see what the GOP convention does in August. At the same time, as he has often done before, he praised Nixon highly.

Still, there is some Republican grumbling that Nixon is such a controversial figure that the party might better wait to drop him.

Nixon was sitting tight, accepting no calls from reporters. The New York Times, in a dispatch from Washington, said today Eisenhower will support Nixon for renomination if Nixon "wants it." The Times continued:

WORDS PASSED — "This was the word being passed today by a highly qualified source to influential Republican leaders to head off a developing battle over second place on the party's ticket."

It was emphasized that the decision about running again was up to Mr. Nixon and he has not made it yet.

The GOP campaign planning, in its preliminary stages, puts about as much emphasis on Senate and House candidates as on the top of the ticket—a hope that Eisenhower will run as well as in 1952 and that congressional nominees won't trail as far behind him.

The Times also said the qualified source—"while declaring President Eisenhower's unreserved support of Mr. Nixon for whatever post he might want"—said it was conceivable that Nixon might decide his own political ambitions for an eventual try at the presidency in his own right would be served by not seeking reelection.
