N. E. Berry Death In Peru Told

Mr. N. E. Berry, 62, one of the principal owners of the Klamath Falls Medical-Dental Building, died March 2 in Lima, Peru. He had been in Lima for a week and was beginning an extended South American tour. A cable from the U.S. Ambassador in Lima to Mr. Berry's relatives in Seattle, Washington did not give cause of death.

Mr. Berry was born in Waterville, Kansas in 1892 and was a member of the class of 1912 at the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis. He attended Lawrence University, Lawrence, Kansas after leaving the Naval Academy receiving a degree in law from the Kansas school Mr. Berry practiced law in Topeka, Kansas until 1922 when he moved to Seattle where he entered the banking business.

In 1929 Mr. Berry and Seattle associates purchased the site of the old Central School at Ninth and Main streets and planned to build a bank building, hotel, apartment house and garage on the site.

The Oregon Bank Building, now the Medical-Dental Building, was the only one of the four buildings to be erected before the business crash of 1929-30 halted further construction.

The Montgomery Ward Co. store now occupies the site of the proposed hotel and the Market Basket grocery store was built on the site originally intended for the apartment house and garage. A tunnel under Ninth Street which was to have connected the four buildings is still in existence.

The Seattle business man is survived by his former wife and close business associate, Gorda Anderson Berry, whom he married in 1935 in Klamath Falls.

Other survivors include a son N. E. Berry Jr., Los Angeles, California; a daughter, Mrs. Natalie Pinkerton, Seattle; a sister, Mrs. Mary Hocker, Kansas; and a brother John L. Berry, Kansas; also four grandchildren.

Seattle funeral arrangements are pending arrival of the body by air from Peru.
