The last entrants in the Oregon class A-1 and A-2 basketball tournaments will be decided in games this week.

The eleventh of 16 teams to play in the A-1 meet at Eugene starting March 11 is Marshfield. The Pirates downed Roseburg, 65-50, Saturday night to join Jefferson and Franklin of Portland, Eugene, South Salem, Corvallis, Beaverton, McMinnville, Medford, Klamath Falls and Central Catholic of Portland in the tourney.

Lincoln and Washington will play Tuesday or Wednesday to decide which will be the Portland city league's third representative.

Milwaukie and Astoria will meet Tuesday. The winner will play Gresham Thursday for a state tourney berth.

North Bend and Cottage Grove clash at Roseburg Tuesday. The winner will meet North Salem for a tournament place.

Baker, Milton-Freewater and Pendleton are in a playoff to determine their district's two entries in the meet. Baker meets Pendleton Tuesday and the winner will get one position. The loser will play Milton-Freewater for the second berth.

Four of the eight teams in the A-2 meet have been determined. They are St. Francis of Eugene, Stayton, Redmond and Ontario.

Toledo and Newport will play Tuesday for one berth and Central Point and Coquille will vie for another.

22-Foot Putt Puts Mayfield In Top Spot

BATON ROUGE (AP) — Shelley Mayfield, a three-stroke winner in the \$12,500 Baton Rouge Open, today headed for his Los Angeles home and a visit with his new daughter.

Mayfield dropped a 22-foot putt for a birdie on the par-four 17th hole yesterday, then sank a six-footer for another birdie on the last hole to pull away from Jimmy Demaret after the two were even for 10 holes.

The blond, sun-tanned Californian, chalking up his first victory on the winter tour, finished with a 69 over the 72-hole, 4,450-yard Baton Rouge Country Club course. He had a 277 total and won \$2,200.

Demaret, Kiamesha Lake, N.Y., had a par 72 and fell into a five-way tie for second at 290 after 72 holes. As a 61 and Demaret shared the lead at the three-quarter mark.

Deadlocked with Demaret were Doug Ford, also of Kiamesha Lake; Walter Burkemo, Franklin, Mich.; Freddie Haas, Claremont, Calif.; and Fred Hawkins, El Paso, Tex.

Ford and Burkemo both finished with 68s. Hawkins had 70 and Haas 71.

Mayfield was asked about his plan. He replied:

"I'm going to Los Angeles. I had a new daughter 69 weeks ago and I want to spend some time with her."

Sante Controversy Still Rages With New Run Done

NEW YORK (AP) — You can't tell the players without a program, so here's a rundown on the principals in the strangest track and field case in American history.

Was Santee—America's No. 1 miler. Suspended for life by the Amateur Athletic Union for accepting excessive expenses after being cleared by his own district association on the same charges.

A temporary injunction enabled him to run in the Knights of Columbus Columbus Mile last Saturday. His winning time was 4:13.8.

Charles P. Grimes—Santee's attorney, and from the results thus far, a mighty successful one. He obtained the injunction, then fought off an AAU appeal.

Pinky Sober—Chief of the AAU's track and field committee, who wrote the report that convicted Santee. He acts as announcer at Madison Square Garden meets and only he knows how he felt when he was forced to announce Santee as an entry in the mile.

Dan Ferris—The big man in the AAU, who usually says nothing that might get him in trouble on any side. This time he thought he was on safe ground, though, and warned meet promoters that they'd be thrown out of the AAU if they had any truck with Santee.

The courts decided otherwise and he had to back down.

Avery Brundage—Here's the key man, All-powerful in Olympic circles, athletes, coaches and governments fear him. To put it mildly, he is no admirer of Santee.

Santee's temporary injunction runs out Friday and a hearing will be held in New York State Supreme Court to determine if it should be made permanent. If it is made permanent, then the miler is an amateur in good standing no matter what the AAU says and he'll go in the Milwaukee Journal Games Saturday.

Before the Columbus Mile, Brundage thundered from his California retreat:

"If I were those amateurs, I wouldn't run against Santee."

That was enough for anyone. Most of the other big names ducked out. The ran in a "special" mile, won by Ron Delany in 4:11.4.

The rest of the K. of G. meet was buried under the Santee controversy, but there were some fine performances, namely Don Bragg's 15-15 1/2 pole vault and George Snyder's 6-1 60-yard dash. Bragg's effort was the highest ever in the Garden and Snyder's clocking equaled the world indoor record for the distance held by numerous runners.

Other winners were Charlie Pratt of the Army in the 60-yard high hurdles (7.2), Charlie Jenkins of Villanova in the 500 (1:10.5), Horace Ashenfelter of the New York C. in the two-mile (9:05.3) and Frank McLaughlin of St. Joseph's of Philadelphia in the 1,000 (2:14.1).

Ex-Coach Scores Dumb Player Pay

PORTLAND (AP) — An un-cager Beaver who could neither read nor write well, got more money at Oregon State College than permissible under Pacific Coast Conference rules, Kip Taylor told a sportsmen's banquet Saturday night.

Taylor was fired as OSC football coach after the 1954 season. He did not identify the player, whom he said subsequently flunked out. Taylor said: "He could neither read nor write."

But afterward, a reporter who questioned him said that Taylor told him he merely meant the player was an extremely poor student.

Taylor told the group that college football is being ruined by what he called overzealousness. He referred to recent exposes about the University of Washington and UCLA athletic situations.

Taylor warned:

"Something must be done to combat this problem. Not only is it ruining the game, but it is harming a lot of fine boys. They are coming to expect too much and thus are losing their sense of values."

"The situation has gotten so bad that it has even extended to the high school level. There are cases, right here in Oregon, where a man has gotten a job and a house to live in just because his son is a good tackle."

Taylor now is manager of a golf and country club in Portland.

Kaiser's Try For World's Speedboat Record Fails

HONOLULU (UP) — The Hawaii-Kai, a speedboat owned by industrialist Henry J. Kaiser, today was rated good "only for firewood" in the wake of a spectacular flipover when it seemed headed for a world unlimited hydroplane record.

The craft spun over yesterday on Keahi Lagoon after it had attained a speed of 193 miles per hour. The driver, Kenneth S. Oegger, 34, was thrown clear of the thrashing boat and escaped with a broken leg and a black eye.

ON WAY TO RECORD

"He was way over the record when he dumped," said Kent Hitchcock of Ledo Isle, Calif., racing commissioner of the American Power Boat Association.

"There's no doubt about it—if the boat had held together he would have had the world record in the bag."

Stanley Sayres' Sto-Mo-Shun IV set the unlimited hydroplane record of 174.97 miles per hour in Seattle July 7, 1952. However, the record for all speedboats belongs to Donald Campbell of Great Britain who powered his turbojet hydroplane across Lake Mead at Boulder City, Nev., last Nov. 16 at 212 miles per hour.

Hitchcock said the accident was caused by a broken rudder shaft which resulted in the rudder falling off the boat.

LUCKY GUY

"He (St. Oegger) is the luckiest guy alive today," Hitchcock declared. "If he hadn't been thrown free he would be dead."

St. Oegger, a former fighter pilot who lives in La Crescenta, Calif., bounced on his back 100 yards from the Hawaii-Kai. His shoes and helmet were ripped off and rescuers found him semiconscious.

The Hawaii-Kai and Scooter Two, Kaiser's other boat, had been trying since Wednesday to set a new mark.

NY Knicks Scrape Over

A clutch triumph in double overtime gave the New York Knicks a new lease on life today in their battle for a playoff berth in the National Basketball Assn., but another wasted opportunity left Rochester in trouble.

The Knicks, all but out of the playoff running a week ago, came through with a 118-111 victory over the Syracuse Nationals at Syracuse on Sunday, moving within just one game of the Nats in the battle for third place in the Eastern Division.

Rochester could have climbed out of last place in the West, because third - place St. Louis finished a 113-94 decision to Minneapolis. But Rochester also went down to defeat before Fort Wayne, 103-88. The Royals trail St. Louis by only a half-game but are large behind in the vital "lost" column.

In the other Sunday game, Boston outtraced Philadelphia, 128-114.

Butts was declared winner of the skelmeister award for the best all-around performance in the four-day meet.

The Class II jumping title, won last year by Dion, was captured Sunday by Jim Brennan Jr., 16, of Leavenworth, Wash. Brennan jumped 117 and 119 feet for 185.8 points.
