Saltonstall Raps Kefauver

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Saltonstall (R-Mass.) today challenged as "extreme and excessive" a charge by Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) that President Eisenhower is letting the United States fall behind Russia in aerial and missile power.

Kefauver, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said in a campaign speech in Rochester, N.H., last night that Russia now is producing a "super-bomber" which he claimed can "out-run the fighters now available."

"We have no such bomber even on the drawing board as far as I am aware," Kefauver said in winding up a five-day drive for Democratic presidential nomination delegates.

He asserted also that Eisenhower has made no decision in a dispute which, he said, has "raged within the government" over whether to "go all-out in attempting to build a true intercontinental missile — the so-called ultimate weapon."

He said, "There is every reason to believe that the Soviet Union is ahead of us" in the missile development race.

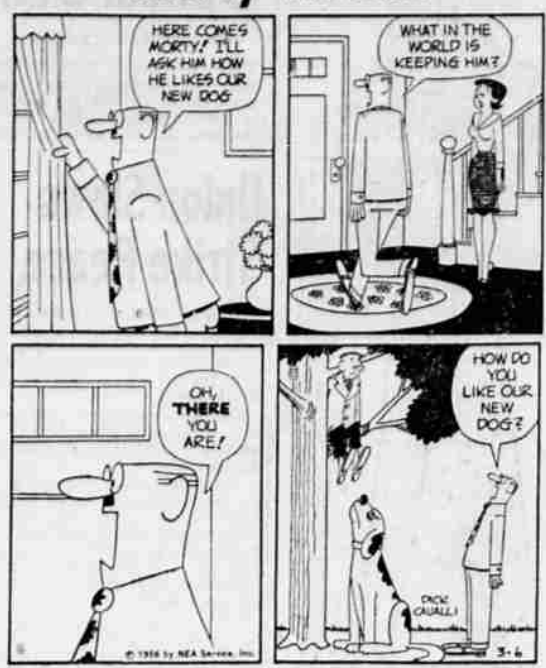
Saltonstall, a member of an Armed Services subcommittee created to investigate the adequacy of American air power, replied.

"It is a political year and Sen. Kefauver is making a political statement of extreme and excessive character," Saltonstall said.

Kefauver said Gen. Nathan F. Twining, Air Force chief of staff, had told of the Soviet bomber in testimony last week before the armed services group. He said Senators Symington (D-Mo.) and Jackson (D-Wash.) informed him of what Twining said.

But Saltonstall indicated in an interview that he did not recall such information as Kefauver mentioned having been given to the committee.
