

Strike End Reported Dim

WASHINGTON (AP)—Union negotiators continued to hold out today for more favorable terms than government mediators have proposed for ending the 143-day Westinghouse strike.

Company representatives accepted the government plan yesterday.

A federal mediation service panel which drafted the settlement package refused to change its provisions despite pleas from James B. Carey, president of the International Union of Electrical Workers.

The plan would give the Westinghouse Electric Corp. a five-year contract, similar to one negotiated by the IUE with another major electrical manufacturing firm, the General Electric Co.

The government-proposed terms also would provide safeguards the union wanted against company job changes designed to promote economy.

Annual wage increases ranging from 5 cents to more than 17 cents an hour, plus pension and insurance improvements, also were recommended.

David L. Cole, Paterson, N. J., attorney and one of the mediators, said the recommendations were designed to be fair to both sides. The company's acceptance statement said Westinghouse felt the terms are "fair to both company and union."

Carey was reported insisting on outright reinstatement of 95 strikers fired by the company for alleged violence. The panel suggested that 59 of these strikers be reinstated and that the remaining 36 cases be submitted to arbitration. This was accepted by the company.

Other than resisting the proposed arbitration, Carey said he had other objections to the settlement plan. He did not elaborate.

More than 50,000 workers have been idle in 40 Westinghouse plants. The IUE represents about 44,000 of them. The United Electrical Workers represents about 10,000.

Ford Stock Goes On Sale

NEW YORK (AP)—Ford Motor stock goes on sale through the New York Stock Exchange today, just seven weeks after it first became available to the public in over-the-counter trading.

Business and financial leaders planned to attend the opening of the stock exchange when the Ford stock will be listed for the first time on the "big board."

At the same time Benson Ford, a vice president of the 2.4 billion dollar auto giant and grandson of its founder, was expected to reveal for the first time how many people owned shares in the company.

Shareholders have paid from \$11 to \$49.87 1/2 for the 30.2 million shares which went on sale over-the-counter March 18. Its initial price was \$64.50 a share but it bounded quickly as high as \$71 in the unlisted market. Its closing price Tuesday was \$61.78 1/2.

Stock issued by the Ford Motor Co. to employees and officers has raised the total number of shares outstanding to 11,331,450 shares.

Sale of the stock has cut the Ford family's hold over the company from 100 per cent to 40 per cent of the voting power. However, the other 60 per cent is spread so the Fords are assured control of the company.

Last year Ford became one of the world's top money earners, with sales of almost \$5 billion dollars and net income after taxes of 437 million dollars. The company ranks as one of the nation's biggest and richest.

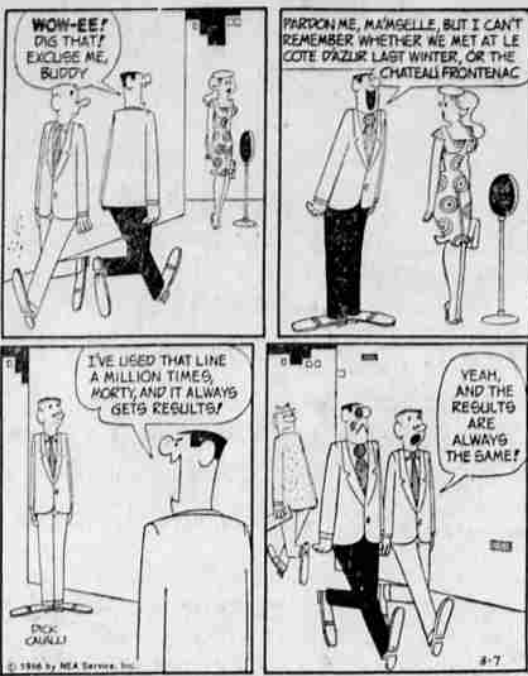
Friction Touches Off Brazil Riots

Continuation of the education ban was a gesture to socialists and other leftists who have denounced the government's earlier declaration that it will permit the establishment of private universities in Argentina.

MANILA, P.I. (AP)—City Councilman Apolinario Goner said today he would introduce a resolution to make Filipino women offer their lips to local males before foreigners.

He was outraged that a Filipino girl asked American actor Marlon Brando at a press conference here to "kiss me" and Brando refused.

"Gentlemen, look," Goner told newsmen. "Our foreign policy is run by Americans, and our economy is controlled by Chinese. Let us not allow foreigners to control our love life."

Goner said that if the woman who asked Brando for a kiss, had come to him first, "I would have given her full satisfaction."

The Filipino race, Goner said, is "more virile, more romantic than any other race in the world."

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Jefferson Davis Highway Marker Turns Up Missing

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—The Pacific end marker of the Jefferson Davis Highway turned up missing today.

Then, the highway itself couldn't be found.

Allen Perry, city superintendent of parks, was notified by the Daughters of the Confederacy that a bronze plaque was missing from its granite base in the city plaza.

It was placed there May 12, 1926, to mark the "first Pacific terminal of the Jefferson Davis Highway."

And how about the highway itself?

"Don't ask me," said Perry.

The police thought vandals may have taken the plaque but could hardly have carried off a highway.

The California State Highway Division searched records here but failed to find anything bearing on Jefferson Davis Highway.

It is still there and inscriptions chiseled into the granite say it was "dedicated by our beloved President, Calvin Coolidge, Nov. 17, 1926," as a "milestone of the Old Spanish Trail from St. Augustine, Fla., to San Diego, Calif."

There is a plaque on the back of the monument from which the Jefferson Davis marker is missing which reads: "May 12, 1926, Dixie Savannah, Ga., to San Diego, Calif."

The plaza information booth, maintained to help visitors, knew nothing about the Jefferson Davis, Dixie or Spanish Trail highways. It advised taking U.S. Highway 80 to Texas and East. "That'll get you there," the man said.

At the San Diego Historical Society, the placing of the plaque was recalled.

The society also recalled that there had been some controversy over highway routes and names and that another monument had been placed in the plaza the same year.
