

SEATO Agrees On Plebiscite

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP)—Official sources said the foreign ministers of the eight Southeast Asia Treaty nations agreed today to support Pakistan's demand for an immediate plebiscite in the big Himalayan state of Kashmir.

OTI Courses Favored By AF

OTI is one of 23 schools and colleges throughout the nation to have courses approved for "by-pass specialists" in the United States Air Force, according to word received here by Institute Director W. D. Purvine and USAF T-Sgt. Donald Adams. A total of 32 technical courses at OTI are approved on this list, by far the largest number at any college.

Among the courses approved were 17 at the Milwaukee School of Engineering, 11 at Oklahoma A&M, and smaller numbers at Pennsylvania State University, Rochester Institute of Technology, Southern Technical Institute, and others.

The by-pass specialist program of the Air Force allows graduates from courses and schools on the approved list to take the Air Force Job Knowledge test pertaining to his field immediately upon enlistment. If he passes this test satisfactorily, he will immediately be assigned to his career field.

If his test grade does not show sufficient proficiency for this assignment, he is given further training in his field, and then assigned to such duty. In this case, he is allowed to begin training at the level he has already achieved, according to the USAF release concerning "by-pass specialists."

Trade Curbs Showdown Set

WASHINGTON (AP)—Investigating senators pointed today toward a possible showdown with the Eisenhower administration over how much information about East-West trade curbs they may air publicly.

With that session scheduled for tomorrow, the Senate Investigations subcommittee called to a hearing today witnesses it said would discuss sales of electrical goods to Russia. The witnesses were not named in advance.

Secretary of Commerce Weeks sent word he would be willing to testify tomorrow and Presidential Asst. Harold E. Stassen and other officials on Friday about the curbs, which were relaxed in 1954 by agreement of the Western nations.

Earlier, Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) and other subcommittee members had threatened congressional action in an attempt to obtain top-level testimony. They did so after Weeks and Stassen refused to allow subordinates to discuss trade policy decisions at a public hearing.

Negroes Meet With Solon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two Negroes reporting on what they termed a "very cordial" meeting yesterday with Sen. Eastland (D-Miss.), said he spoke out against racial violence in the South but expressed uncertainty about how to curb it.

Cos. Courts of Belmont, Miss., and C. R. Darden of Meridian, Miss., gave their report at a Civil Rights Assembly of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People.

They called on Eastland, an outspoken foe of racial integration, as part of a "lobbying" drive by assembly delegates who sought support for civil rights legislation.

On this score, Darden said, Eastland declined to commit himself. The senator "didn't know just what could be done at this time" about violence, Darden added.

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mously on a resolution calling for "immediate implementation" of the 1948 United Nations resolution recommending a statewide vote to decide whether the disputed border area should join India or Pakistan.

Butter opposition was expected from India, whose Prime Minister Nehru has persistently rejected plans for a U.N. plebiscite in the largely Moslem state. A U.N. cease-fire late in 1948 ended hard fighting in Kashmir between Indian troops and Pakistani tribesmen, leaving the state divided between an Indian-dominated government and a pro-Pakistan faction.

A government spokesman in New Delhi declined to comment immediately, but other Indian circles said that U.S. Secretary of State Dulles' support of Pakistan would stir up as great Indian resentment as did his statement calling Goa a province of Portugal. Dulles is to visit Nehru after the SEATO conference ends.

Conference sources said the foreign ministers spoke out one by one in support of a Kashmir plebiscite.

Dulles, they said, quoted a speech by the U.S. ambassador to Pakistan, Horace Hildreth, in supporting the bid. Hildreth's speech had urged U.N. action.

Annual Vision Week Begins

Better vision care is needed to make it easier for Americans to read, the Oregon Optometric Association said today as the 29th annual Save Your Vision Week (March 4-10) got under way.

"In many European countries newspapers and books are read by a much higher proportion of the population than in America," Dr. Norman B. Hayes, president of the association, said. "In the United Kingdom 611 daily newspapers are sold every day per 1,000 inhabitants, according to a UNESCO report. In Sweden the figure is 490. In the United States it is 353."

"American newspapers are larger, so each buyer gets more to read, but the significant fact is that relatively few Americans take advantage of the newspapers and other printed matter available. Television, radio, and motion pictures divert American interests from reading."

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The current internal revenue code provides for a medical deduction but specifies certain limitations.

The deduction allowed for medical and dental expenses is only for certain expenses paid during the

taxable year and not compensated for by insurance or otherwise during the taxable year. The amount allowed is the excess of such expenses over 3 per cent of the adjusted gross income. This limitation does not apply to expenses incurred by a taxpayer or his spouse if either has reached the age of 65. Their medical expenses are allowed in full, except for maximum limitations. However, medical expenses paid for dependents are subject to the 3 per cent limitation.

The deduction in any event is limited to \$2500 times the number of exemptions, with a maximum of \$10,000 on a joint return of husband and wife, or a return of a head of a family, or the return of a surviving spouse, and \$5000 on any other return. For the purpose of the maximum limitations, the number of exemptions does not include the additional exemptions allowed to a taxpayer if he or his spouse has attained the age of 65 or is blind.

Limitations on medicine and drugs is spelled out. Amounts paid during the taxable year may be taken into account only to the extent that their aggregate for the year exceeds 1 per cent of the adjusted gross income.

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only those paid for a type of insurance that reimburses the insured for medical expenses, thus reducing the allowable deduction.

A word of caution to those who wish to use this deduction: Be sure the expenditure falls within the definition of a medical deduction. Have receipts to substantiate the amounts claimed when you prepare your return, whether you do it independently or with the assistance of a qualified tax adviser.
