Ford Star Jubilee To Show Bing Crosby In 'High Tor'

NEW YORK (AP)—While the piano is essential to composer Arthur Schwartz, he found the telephone a very handy instrument in writing the music for "High Tor," a play with music starring Bing Crosby and Julie Andrews. It comes to the TV home audience next Saturday night on Ford Star Jubilee.

To go back a bit, High Tor is a mountain overlooking the beautiful Hudson River Valley. Playwright Maxwell Anderson took it as the location and title for his successful Broadway play of several seasons ago. It's the story of a contemporary guy (Crosby) who owns High Tor and to the distress of his fiancée (Julie Andrews) falls in love with the ghost of a Dutch girl (Miss Andrews) dead 300 years.
The composer of such hits as "Dancing in the Dark" and "Something to Remember You By," Schwartz also leads an extraordinary double life as a producer.

Video Enters Sawmill Trade

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Television has entered the sawmill business. Lumbermen attending the 25th annual meeting of the Western Pine Association learned today how closed-circuit TV has been used in siting up and positioning logs going through the head band saw.
A report on the usefulness of TV was delivered by Carl A. Rasmussen, head of the Western Pine research laboratory in Portland. He discussed the results of a trial TV installation at an Eastern Washington sawmill.

CHILOQUIN—The coming All-Indian Invitational Basketball Tournament to be held March 15, 16 and 17 in the Chiloquin High School was the chief item of business of the Reservation Jaycee meeting held Tuesday night in the high school. It had been requested that an all star reservation team be included in the tournament in addition to the two winning teams of the recent reservation tournament, but due to the fact that plans were nearly complete for the eight team meet, it was voted down.

It is hoped that the type of award can be announced at the athletic banquet to be given Saturday night by the Jaycees in connection with the PTA and the Firebellies.

The next regular meeting of the group will be a social. It will be a dinner in the Sprague River School on the evening of Tuesday, March 20.

Timber Rules Review Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) called Wednesday for a thorough review of existing competitive restrictions on the sale of federal timber.
He said he questioned whether timber is being sold "in terms which give all qualified bidders a chance to participate."
He referred to a 1944 law which permits the government to award timber non-competitively to a company or to select an area and require that federal timber be sold only to companies within that area.
"If there were more timber than the sawmills needed," he said, "allocation or setting up of units would be simple. However, we have more mills than timber and each effort to set up a unit brings a storm of protest from those who may be shut out."
The suggestion was one of several which the senator submitted in a statement to a subcommittee studying timber management problems.
Magnuson also urged the Committee to determine "whether we are getting the best service out of the present organization of our forestry agencies," and supplied his own view.

Friends Of President Ignore Furor Over Health Issue

Editor's Note—This is the first in a series of articles by AP's national political reporters who are surveying the situation in the light of President Eisenhower's decision to seek a second term.

NEW YORK (AP)—The people who "Like Ike" appear to be placidly ignoring the hullabaloo over his health and running mate.

That is one of the chief impressions gained by this reporter in a sampling of public opinion in New York state — talks with both political leaders and the man in the street.

Democrats believe their argument that President Eisenhower's heart attack makes him a part-time executive will have its effect by election day.

Also, they believe they have a vulnerable target in controversial Vice President Nixon if he should run again with Eisenhower.

But at this stage, the Eisenhower adherents do not seem to be swayed on these issues.

Democratic attacks on Nixon, and even some aversion to him within the GOP, appear to puzzle the average Republican who is interviewed.

"He always has been Johnny-on-the-spot to help Ike," said a Hudson business man. "He's been a hard-working vice president."

He expressed belief that talk of dropping Nixon from the ticket stemmed from a high-level battle for the second spot rather than in any rank-and-file revolt.

The Albany Times-Union inquiring photographer quoted half a dozen persons who said they intended to vote for Eisenhower, and none registered any objection to Nixon.

On Eisenhower's health, a New York City Democrat said the public was getting only one side of the picture — emphasis on his activities but little on the rest periods his doctors ordered.

"Every time Ike swings at a golf ball you see a picture of him in the papers," he said. "But you never see a picture of him taking his two-hour nap."

A Hudson Valley filling station operator, an Eisenhower supporter last time and this time, put it this way: "Ike knows best how he feels and what he can do. If he feels he

Dr. B. H. Franklin, Democrat, has filed for county commissioner and C. W. Ogle, Democrat, has filed for reelection to that office. Earlier filings for commissioner were Haskell Thornton, Democrat and Clarence Tracy, Republican.
Filings close March 9.

Missing Girl Found Unharmed

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—Looking like "a little lump of sand," a 21-year-old girl was found unharmed after spending a chilly night wedged under a porch five blocks from home.
A bath, hot soup and milk restored little Virginia Gardner at Desert Hospital yesterday, but she was kept there for observation.
About 150 searchers looked high and low in the desert resort for more than 18 hours after Virginia disappeared Monday night.
A laborer, Jess Garnica, said he "heard a baby crying somewhere" and when he traced the sound he found Virginia under a porch, covered by drifted sand. Apparently she slept through a howling wind storm during which the temperature dropped to 30 degrees.
"She can't tell us how it happened but it doesn't matter, now," said her happy father, William Gardner, a postal clerk.
