

Coed Wants 'Bama Degree

NEW YORK (AP)—Athena Lucy says she still wants to attend the University of Alabama.

The National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People issued this statement yesterday in behalf of the 26-year-old expelled Negro coed.

"Despite all that has happened I continue to hope, wish and work that I may be able to pursue my education at the state university of my home state. But up until the present time I have been thwarted in my effort to do that. Therefore, I have got to follow two courses — to persist in my efforts to be admitted to the University of Alabama next fall and also to make applications to other schools — because I am sincerely interested in getting an education in the University of Alabama if I can but, if not, in another school.

"I would hope that there are unsegregated universities in the Southland on whose campuses I may find welcome as a student."

GOP Senators Back Nixon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Half a dozen Republican senators agreed today that President Eisenhower has put Vice President Nixon on the inside track for renomination on this year's GOP ticket.

Eisenhower said yesterday he has told Nixon to "chart his own course and tell me what he would like to do." Nixon said he had no announcement to make "as far as my own personal situation is concerned."

Sen. Mundt (R-SD) said he is confident Nixon will seek renomination if the decision is his to make.

"I assume that Nixon is going to be Eisenhower's running mate because I think the vice president likes his present job," Mundt said. "I don't know of any movement to dump him. I am convinced the Republicans in the House and Senate want him on the ticket again with Eisenhower."

Eisenhower declined again yesterday to say specifically whether he wants Nixon as a running mate this year, but he told his news conference he has "no criticism of Vice President Nixon to make, either as a man, an associate or as my running mate on the ticket."

Sen. Allen (R-Ohio) said that sounded to him as though the President were beckoning Nixon to run.

Sen. Thye (R-Minn) said he thinks Nixon has "the inside track." Senators Young (R-ND) and Bender (R-Ohio) both said they assume Nixon's place on the ticket is secure.

Group Gathers Indian Relics

Four More Ft. Klamath Snow Surveys Show Heavy Fall

PORT KLAMATH — Four more official snow surveys in this area were made in late January and February and results show unusually heavy snow in localities where measurements are taken each winter.

On January 31, the second trip to the summit of Sun Mountain east of Port Klamath was made by Ben Foster and Joe Jackson, foresters of the U.S. Indian Forest Service, Klamath Agency and Nelson Sharp of Klamath Agency U.S. Land Operations. The men went by panel truck to the Lorin M. Streeter ranch northeast of here on Wood River, donning snowshoes to make the 13 mile round trip to the mountain summit. Here they measured 26 inches of snow with 34-inch water content; on the first snow survey trip made December 31 by Conrad Shelland, Foster and Hank Waugh, there were 56 inches of snow with 26-inch water content.

On the latest and third trip, made February 28 by Foster and Jackson, accompanied by land operator Hank Waugh, snow measurements taken showed 14 1/2 inches of snow with 38.8 inches water content. Since that date, it has been snowing heavily in this area, and undoubtedly by this time the all time high record established on the February 28, 1952, trip to the mountain top has been broken. At that time, the snow was nine feet 10 inches deep with a water content of 43 inches, which exceeded all records since snow statistics were recorded at Klamath Agency. The 1952 February trip was made by Conrad Shelland, Dwight Patton and Mark Kary of the U.S. I.F.S., Klamath Agency.

In contrast to this season's heavy snowfall, last year's February 27 Sun Mountain snow survey showed three feet eight inches of snow, with 13.6 inches water content, which was far below normal, in common with general conditions all over the west. The result was an unusually arid summer last year, when ranchers in the Wood River Valley were forced to irrigate their pastures heavily, and grass conditions were very poor. The grass should grow tall this year.

The fourth and final snow survey trip of this winter to be made by Klamath Agency employees will be undertaken the latter part of this month.

The end of March will also mark the last of the three cooperative winter snow surveys made by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the state of Oregon. Two such surveys have already been completed by Elmore Nicholson, Port Klamath, and Lee Hunsaker, of Prineville. Arrangements for three annual trips to the Seven Lakes country west of Port Klamath are made by W. T. (Jack) Frost of the Portland office of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

On each trip, the two men stay at Seven Lakes in a cabin which had been stocked in the fall with provisions and other supplies for

their overnight stay. They travel on snowshoes from the Seven Mile round trip to and from the Seven Lakes territory. The first trip was made on January 21, and 19 feet six inches of snow measured; on the second trip, February 22, Nicholson and Hunsaker found 13 feet of snow; water content was not determined. The first trip was made easily, but the February trek on snowshoes was a hard one, due to hard snow conditions, and the going was rough, according to the two making the trip. The January trip made last season showed only six feet five inches of snow, with seven feet eight inches recorded on the February trip last year.

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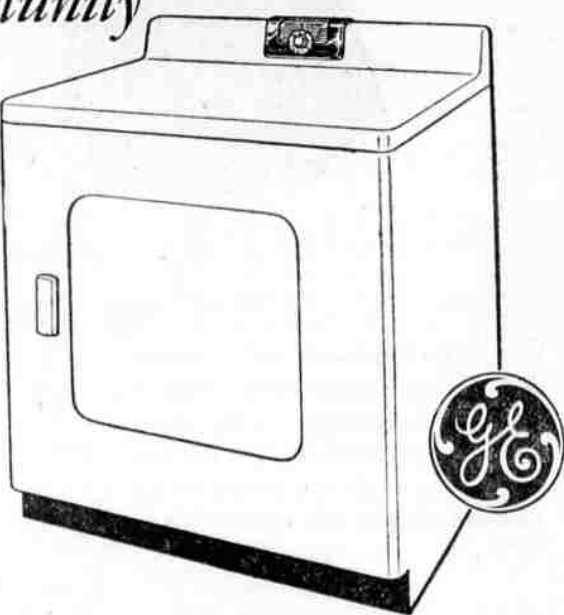
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
