Engineer Tells Snow Figures

SILVER LAKE — Snow depths at both Windigo and Willamette passes are 160 to 170 inches with approximately 67 inches of moisture content, about twice as much as last year's, according to Jack L. Gillette, soil conservation service engineer from the Silver Lake office. The snow survey was done last week by George Smith of Redmond, in charge of surveys in the area, assisted by Gillette.

Going in by snow cat, the men encountered drifts and blizzard conditions Thursday at Willamette Pass and samples freezing in measuring tubes slowed the men up. They finished by flashlight at 11 p.m., Gillette reported.

SURPRISE CAKE

Weathermen May Give Odds

FRESNO, Calif. — If Fresno meteorologists have their way, you soon may be able to get a "morning line" on the weather.

Chief Forecaster A. A. Lohman has proposed that the Weather Bureau be permitted to use odds-makers' terminology in making predictions.

Lohman's forecasts would go something like this: "There's a 50-50 chance of light showers today." Or "It's 6 to 5 there'll be rain before nightfall."

The odds would replace such familiar — and indefinite — terms as "probable, possible and likely."
