STORY OF RUGS OF ORIENT TO BE TOLD LIBRARY CLUB

Hiraz, Bejar, Cabestan or Sarouk—all are words to conjure with. John Korenian will explain them in his talk on Oriental rugs at the meeting of the Woman's Library Club tomorrow at 2 p.m. in the club rooms of the city library, South Fifth and Main streets.

"Oriental rugs, as we Americans know them, receive their names from the places where they are made," Korenian explained. Belu-chistan or Afghanistan rugs come from these places, as do Kerman (usually of floral design) or Kashan, for example.

Displayed at the meeting tomorrow will be several museum pieces of silk which have been gifts to Korenian, one of them from Haile Selassie, emperor of Ethiopia. This rug, of Hiraz silk, is unusual because all of the silk used to make it is of natural color and has not been dyed. The rug is 430 years old and bears the "Tree of Life" design.

Gifts from the Shah of Persia and the Maharajah of Indor (who married Nancy Anne Miller of Seattle) will also be shown.

Koreanian has been buying Oriental rugs, at the source, for 32 years, and supplies many dealers in the west. He has traveled a "million miles" throughout the world to choose rugs and become friendly with the tribes that make them.

Born in Armenia, he learned the weaver's craft as a boy. This was customary in his country at that time. The Kurds were his teachers—makers of "Kurdistan" rugs. Others of his family learned other crafts—wood carving, for example, or work with mother-of-pearl. The famous carving of "The Last Supper" which has been exhibited for charity countless times throughout the country by Korenian, took 27 years to complete by this relative who learned to carve in mother-of-pearl.

Coming to this country as a young man, Korenian spent only a few months here before World War I began in Europe. He returned to France and enlisted, partly because he was concerned about his family who were then living in Turkey.

Following the entrance of Great Britain into the war, he transferred to the English army and spent four years, until the end of World War I, in British Army Intelligence.

He returned to the United States, settled in Medford, became an American citizen and has made the northwest his home ever since—except when traveling abroad or at home to collect rugs or exhibit "the" carving.

A question and answer period will follow Korenian's talk Monday. Tea will be served under the chairmanship of Mrs. Winston Purvine. Dean Halbert, Klamath Union High School violinist, accompanied by Rosemary Spetz, will present a group of instrumental selections. Dean was last year's Adler music award winner.

Hostesses for the day will be Mrs. John Haffetto and Mrs. Otto Erlanson. Presiding at the tea table will be Mrs. Robert Thompson and Mrs. Claude Davis. Mrs. L. D.
