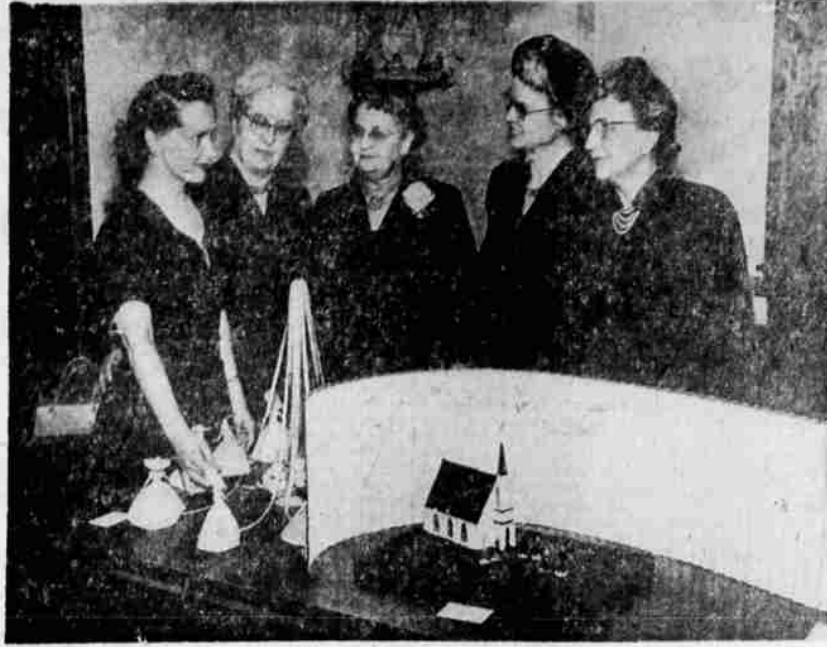
Two Weed Girls Nine Years Old
