Justice Department Objects To Klamath Pact Wording

In the opinion of the U.S. Justice Department, some parts of the wording of the proposed interstate compact between California and Oregon on the use of the waters of the Klamath River are unconstitutional. George Stevenson of Olene, a member of the Oregon Klamath River Commission, reported today.

Last week, Stevenson and several other members of the Oregon and California Klamath River Commissions met with Justice Department officials in Washington to discuss these provisions.

According to Stevenson, the Justice Department had no objections to any of the objectives of the proposed compact, but said that the details of the wording made parts of it unconstitutional. He said a meeting of the joint Oregon-California drafting committee would be held in Klamath Falls on either March 25 or 26 to rewrite the portions of the draft to which the Justice Department objects.

The present operative agreement between the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Bureau of Reclamation, as well as wording in the proposed contract between the United States and the Tulare Irrigation District, (Article Seven) should give assurance that (1) water would be available for use on lands which may be developed by the Interior Department for wildlife conservation and (2) should such lands receive satisfactory usage by waterfowl, they may, upon the order of the Secretary of the Interior, be substituted for lands presently used for waterfowl management and presently served with waters of the Upper Klamath River Basin.

The institute also recommends that the compact be modified to include a guarantee that the permanent commission would be bound by the terms of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and terms of wildlife conservation treaties with Canada and Mexico.

In order to be bound by these terms, the institute claims, guarantees for water for wildlife conservation must be included. The institute claims there are no such guarantees, and in one statement says that the present draft would "deprive these refuges of water."

FBI, Police Capture Bank Bandit In Quick Clean-Up

NEW YORK (AP) — FBI men and police teamed Saturday to bag the second man allegedly involved in the \$188,000 bank robbery at suburban Port Chester March 2. It was one of the quickest cleanups in history of a major bank holdup.

The second arrest was made in almost as strange a way as the first.

FBI agents and police broke down a hotel room door early in the morning to collar Rocco Frank Tateo, 32, an occasional salesman and taxi operator, as he lay in bed. He was unarmed and offered no resistance.

On Wednesday night, FBI men

had grabbed Arthur L. Paisner, 33-year-old partner in a two-horse racing stable venture, as he recuperated in a hospital from a minor operation.

Paisner was nabbed because a Port Chester resident remembered a part of the license number of a car seen about the time of the holdup. Officers said they found \$111,640 in his car trunk.

How officers got on the trail of Tateo wasn't revealed, but the FBI credited the New York police with digging up the necessary information to implicate him.

The FBI reported finding about \$1,500 in a metal box which Tateo had buried Thursday night.

Later U. S. Attorney Paul Williams disclosed in court, and the FBI verified, that another strong box had been found in the home of Tateo's mother, who said Tateo left it there Sunday. Williams said he understood it held about \$10,000.

Williams also said Tateo bought a new car the day after the robbery.

Paisner has been quoted as saying his accomplice—whom he had finally refused to name—was handed \$55,000 of the holdup proceeds. The remaining \$21,000 also has not been accounted for.

The FBI said it was Paisner and Tateo who kidnaped Mrs. Mary Kostolos, 52-year-old teller for the Westchester County Trust Company's drive-in branch at Port Chester, the night before the holdup.

With Paisner masterminding the affair, the FBI said, the pair drove her around all night playing the terrified woman with questions about the bank, then entering the bank with her keys at dawn.

After the arrest of Paisner his horse racing partner, Angelo P. John, 33, was taken into custody and subjected to intensive questioning.

Authorities said \$6,200 found in a closet of his apartment was being checked to see if it was any of the bank money. However, they added, there seemed nothing to implicate him.

He was held, nevertheless, in \$100,000 bond and Tateo was held in the same bill after his arraignment Saturday on charges of violating federal bank robbery statutes.

Snowcat Gets Food To Mine

CRESCENT CITY, Calif. (AP) — A snow tractor loaded with 200 pounds of food reached a mine Friday night where six persons had been stranded since Feb. 13. A radio report from the tracked vehicle said they were all well.

E. H. Pyles, district manager here for the California Oregon Power Co., said Jim Smith of his firm had headed a rescue party of four that reached the mine at 11:30 p. m., after a 10-hour trip from Medford, Ore., over snow-blocked roads.

The six persons were isolated at Azalea Mine No. 1 in California's Del Norte County, six miles north of Gasquet.

They are: Walter Freeman, mine foreman from Grants Pass, Ore.; Mr. and Mrs. James Perry of Seaside, Ore., the mine owners; and three persons from Cave Junction, Ore.—Lou Lively, "Pop" Miller and Larry Lee.

Youths Break Into Store

Two boys, one 18 and the other 17, and three girls, two of them 15 and the other 16, were held in the city jail Saturday morning as the result of a burglary at the Crescent Street Grocery Friday evening.

Except for the 18 year old boy, all of the cases are being investigated by the Klamath County Juvenile Office.

Police indicated that a formal complaint may be filed against the 18 year old on Monday, when the District Attorney's office opens after the weekend. Meanwhile, he is being held on investigation of a charge of breaking and entering.

Police said they received a telephone call at 9:31 p. m. Friday that a group of teenagers was in the store, operated by Cecil Carlie, 402 South Seventh Street. When investigators arrived, they found the two boys and one of the 15-year-old girls inside. All three had money they admitted came from the store, officers reported.

The other girls were found in the auto of one of the boys.

Entry to the store had been gained by breaking a padlock on the back door, police said.

Snow Depth Reported For Mt. Shasta Area

DUNSMUIR — Clem Crough, Mt. Shasta district ranger, reported the snow depth on Mt. Shasta at Horse Camp has reached the depth of 17 1/2 feet, the deepest in several years. Horse Camp is near Panther Meadows, the site of the proposed ski lift.

He stated that the water content of the snow was 69 1/2 inches. Last year the most snow measured on the mountain was slightly more than six feet. The average at Horse Camp is about 11 feet. Crough said the unusually deep snow could provide skiing into July.

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Ike Seen As Conciliator

NEW YORK (AP) — President Eisenhower was pictured by an aide Saturday as "the great conciliator" in efforts to strengthen unity at home and win lasting peace for the world.

Dr. Gabriel Hauge, economic adviser to the President said in a speech at a luncheon meeting of the Women's National Republican Club:

"It is one of the great good fortunes of the republic that today a talented, humble, dedicated soldier-statesman guides our national destiny."

Hauge said it should be "a source of gratification and challenge to us as Republicans that Dwight D. Eisenhower chose our party as the instrument through which to serve our country."

Hauge added that Eisenhower "has proved himself The Great Conciliator in his work of strengthening the unity of our people and of welding together the peoples of the free world into a redoubtable force of just and lasting peace."
