Oliva Hits For 21 To Pace Victory

BAKER (Special) — The Malin Mustangs, led by Norm Oliva, rolled to their first Class B state basketball championship Saturday night, defeating Echo, 60-57 in the tight contest at Baker.

After a tight first quarter, which ended 19-16 for Malin, the Conroy charges tightened their defense and moved to the front by a 37-24 margin at the intermission.

The Klamath County team continued to widen the margin in the third quarter and held a wide 62-41 edge at the end of three quarters.

Norm Oliva contributed 21 points to the Malin cause while Mike Ramon of Echo hit for 15.

Oliva and Roger Dokken of the Mustangs were named to the all-state B team while Ray Johnson, Malin guard, won second team honors and Glen Steyskal was given honorable mention.

The defending champion Knappa team salvaged third place in the tournament with a 76-57 triumph over Elgin in the preliminary game Saturday night. Bob Hunt scored 43 points for Knappa in setting a new tournament record.

Elkton set a three game team scoring record when it defeated Sisters, 64-60, to win fifth place.

Winning their way into the championship tussle and their 24th consecutive victory wasn't an easy one for Coach Jim Conroy's Malin cagers. Their Friday night two point 69-67 triumph came after 32 spine tingling action that saw the Mustangs tip the Mustangs to hand the Mustangs their first lead of the contest, 47-46. In the following seconds, Elgin's Dallas Cason tallied a pair of free tosses to push the Huskies to the front once again and teammate Bob Hunt followed with the lead a two point affair by hitting one of two chances from gift shot alley as Elgin took a 49-47 lead.

With less than a minute remaining in the game, Crouser hit from close-in to cut the Malin lead to a 60-65 margin. Then Malin, trying to use ball-control tactics to pull

the game out, was whittled down for a traveling infraction and Elgin took over. Cason came through for Elgin as he bucketed a shot from the side and Malin's lead was sliced to two points.

Just as the final horn sounded, Steyskal was called for charging Clarence Calder, and Elgin still had a chance to push the game into overtime, and possibly pull out an upset win over the favored Malin quintet, but Calder's first attempt from the charity stripe failed and the game went into the books officially. The final score: Malin-69, Elgin-67, in a hair-raising battle that had the near-capacity crowd bubbling with excitement.

Elgin jumped off to an early lead in the opening minutes of the first quarter, and at the close of the eight minutes of play, the Huskies ruled the contest, 22-16. Calder led the first quarter surge by Elgin as he popped in 13 points.

Betsy Rawls Leads Field

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Blonde Betsy Rawls, 27-year-old professional from Spartanburg, S.C., matched men's par with a 72 Saturday to take a two-stroke lead over Louise Suggs of Sea Island, Ga., after three rounds of the \$5,000 Titleholders Golf championship.

Miss Rawls, two-time National Open champion but never winner of this tournament, goes into Sunday's final round with a 79-75-72-228. Miss Suggs, who has been Titleholders champion twice, has a 78-75-75-228.

Back of the leaders in third place and well within striking distance was Patty Berg of St. Andrews, Ill. The flame-haired defending champion, shooting for her seventh Titleholders crown, shot a 73 on the rugged 6,270-yard Augusta Country Club course Saturday. She has a 54 hole total of 229. Miss Rawls, who set a new nine hole Titleholders record with a 32 Friday, covered the front side in 37 Saturday. She started clocking with her putter after the turn and wound up with three back side birdies and a 35. Miss Rawls had a bulging 43 on the second nine Friday.

Leading the amateurs with a 235 was Willie Smith, 19-year-old St. Clair, Mich., entry. She carded a 79 Saturday.

Amie Quisenberry, 16-year-old from Marysville, Wash., and Atlanta's Dot Kirby were two strokes behind Miss Smith in the amateur battle. Miss Kirby had a 74 Saturday and Miss Quisenberry a 76. Two strokes behind them, with a 239 was amateur Ruth Jensen of Seattle, who carded a 79 Saturday to go with her earlier 84 and 76.

Amateur Bessie Falk of Boise, Idaho, was far behind with 322. Miss Falk had her worst round Saturday, 110. Her previous rounds were 107 and 104.

Paced by Willie "The Whale" Naulls, the UCLA Bruins moved to within one game of a perfect Pacific Coast Conference record Friday night by topping the Southern California Trojans, 85-70.

In other games played Friday night, Stanford eased by California, 66-63; Oregon State upended Oregon, 74-69; and Idaho blasted Washington State, 78-62, in a rough and tumble contest at Moscow.

Naulls poured in 29 points for the Bruins before a hand cut suffered in a scramble for the ball forced him from the game. He is expected to be ready to go again Saturday night, however.

Gambee finished the night with 29 points and Bob Allard contributed 18 more to the OSC total. Max Anderson topped the Ducks with 21. Oregon, controlling the backboards, held a 36-31 lead at the half.

Stanford's Bill Bond ran the length of the floor for a last-second layup to insure the Indians of victory over California. The Ducks had dropped Cal into third place behind Washington, which wound up its schedule last weekend.

Bringing Santa Anita multi-million dollar merry-go-round to a close for the winter season, the 5-year-old "Bobby" virtually snatched his triumph by leading the 900-odd Santa Anita Handicap two Saturdays ago—a front running, wire to wire dash.
