Johnson Urges Bricker Stand

WASHINGTON (UP) — Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson suggested today that the administration take a stand on the new version of the Bricker Amendment before the Senate tackles the controversial proposal.

There is no point, Johnson told the United Press, of calling the amendment up for debate and "knotting the Senate in a knot" if the proposal does not have administration backing. The amendment, a point of controversy for some years, would limit the effectiveness of treaties as domestic law.

It was believed Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland (Calif.) would bring the matter up today at a meeting of GOP congressional leaders with President Eisenhower. Knowland has said he would support the revised amendment and hoped the administration would too.

The revised version of the amendment was approved last week by the Senate Judiciary Committee. It is now up to the Senate Democratic Policy Committee to decide whether to call it before the full Senate for debate.

The new version was drafted by Sen. Everett M. Dirksen (R-Ill.), but it has the full support of Sen. John W. Bricker (R-Ohio), author of previous versions of the amendment.

The proposed amendment, as now drafted, would state: "A provision of a treaty or other international agreement which conflicts with any provision of this Constitution shall not be of any force or effect."

Chessman Asks Pauper Motion

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Condemned convict Caryl Chessman, author of the best-seller "Cell 2455, Death Row," filed a routine petition yesterday asking to be declared a pauper during his next appeal to escape the gas chamber.

The petition, to avoid court costs for the action, will be argued March 19.

Chief Judge William Denman of the appeals court granted the right for a new appeal on Feb. 27, after Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman had denied a Chessman petition for a new trial.

Cold Weather In Prospect

Generally cold weather was the outlook today for most of the country although there was relief from the below-zero blasts in northern Midwest areas.

The southeast corner and sections of the far Southwest were the only mild places.

More rain fell along the leading edges of the arctic air from southeast Texas northeastward through the lower Mississippi Valley, Alabama, Tennessee and the Middle Atlantic Coast states.

Heaviest rains were in extreme east Texas and the lower Mississippi Valley.

Warm moist air streaming northward from the Gulf of Mexico collided with the cold air yesterday, resulting in a long belt of generally light precipitation stretching from Texas to the Great Lakes into New York and parts of the mid-Atlantic coastal area. The precipitation was snow or a mixture of sleet, snow or freezing rain with scattered showers or light rain in Southern regions.

The cold air which spread over Texas lowered temperatures 20 to 30 degrees in most areas.

Lower readings also were reported in New England, the Ohio Valley, the Great Lakes region and the middle and lower Mississippi Valley.

The warming trend was in the northern and central plains and upper Mississippi Valley.
