Home Extension

(Editors Note: This is the second in a series of historical background on the development of home extension work in the United States, written by Hope Holbrook, Klamath County Extension agent.)

Since the time that Winifred Gillen was home extension agent in this county the entire home extension program has been slanted toward the program to aid the homemaker to maintain the highest ideals of home life so that she may secure for herself, her family and her community satisfactory health, happiness and efficiency with a minimum expenditure of energy and money.

Since that time there have been a number of other women who were active as home agents. Helen Stine was the agent in 1946 replacing Mrs. Gillen. Miss Stine is now a homemaker in Klamath Falls. She is Mrs. John Stine who lives in the Yalta Garden district.

Other agents have been Mary Glenn and the former Dolores Bracken.

The home extension program is a full one and is selected by the woman who belongs to the unit.

This year we have been studying dry cleaning at home, food for entertaining, picture selection and framing, making cakes attractive, care of the hair, and making rolls and bread from sweet dough. There will be a workshop on making braided rugs and some evening meetings on the law in the homes of members.

This is the way the program is considered. Each year two women from each community attend county-wide meetings to determine the interests and needs of homemakers. Objectives are chosen to meet which the program is slanted. From this balloting a list is made which will help to meet these objectives. Each member of a home extension unit has a vote on the programs for the year. Klamath County has 700 home extension members. Their suggestions are then considered by the county workers and specialists of Oregon State College. Ideas for practically every project come from a homemaker in some county of the State.

The Klamath County Home Economics Advisory Committee, made up of seven women who represent various areas of Klamath County. Each belongs to a home extension unit. These seven women meet once a month to evaluate the program. They help the county advisers by reporting on conditions in the various localities.

This committee also has many projects it works out. The highlight of the year is the planning for the annual homemakers festival, usually set for the first week in May. This affair is open to the public. Exhibits of the projects accomplished are on display and the meeting provides an opportunity for inter-community visiting.

The festival program provides for an outstanding speaker from outside Klamath County, presentation of the next year's program, a report on the agricultural outlook from an agricultural authority and musical entertainment. Last year over 400 members of the units and guests were present.
