Sluggish Meets Boxer In Tonight's Title Battle Between Basilio, Saxton

CHICAGO (AP)—It's a slugger vs. boxer tonight as welterweight champion Carmen Basilio defends his crown against ex-titlist Johnny Saxton in a nationally televised bout.

Basilio, a wide-in belter, held as

a 2-1 favorite before the weigh-in at the Chicago Stadium.

A crowd of 10,000 is expected to contribute a \$75,000 gate with another \$50,000 coming from TV-radio. The fighters will split 30-30.

This is the second title defense for Basilio, 28, who won the championship from Tony DeMarco June 10, 1955, and then repulsed DeMarco's bid to recapture the crown Nov. 30, the champ's last start.

Saxton, 25, lost the 147-pound title to DeMarco April 1, 1955, on a 14th-round TKO in his first defense after winning the crown from Kid Gavilan.

Although tonight's principals have somewhat similar records—Basilio with 48-11-7 and 22 knockouts and Saxton with 50-4-2 and 20 KO's—the muscular little titlist from Canastota, N. Y., is regarded much the harder puncher.

Basilio is riding a 15-bout unbeaten streak dating from a 15-round loss to Gavilan in a 1953 title match at Syracuse, while Saxton gets this title shot after a modest comeback.

Saxton has won four straight since being dethroned by DeMarco, but that string has only one notable verdict. That was a 10-round decision over Tiger Jones Nov. 9, Saxton's last start.

Whether this is a furious or dull scrap pretty much depends upon Saxton. Basilio knows only one style, bob-weave and bang, putting a lot of steam into his left hooks.

Saxton is a cutie, who can crowd and clinch so cleverly the other fighter looks bad. He has fine speed and boxing skill and not a few of his jabs are expected to be aimed at Basilio's well-scarred brows.

ABC will broadcast and telecast at 10 p.m., EST.

Taft and Naulls were the only unanimous selections.

CEDAR CITY, Utah (AP)—Boise Junior College took control right at the start and continued on to a 70-56 basketball win over Oregon Technical Institute of Klamath Falls in the regional junior college finals here Tuesday night.

Pin-point accuracy by Center Nick Panico was a key factor in the Boise JC win that sends them on to the national junior college tournament at Hutchinson, Kan., March 20-24.

Panico in the first half missed only one shot from the floor, picking up 20 points in that period. He added nine more in the second half. Boise's halftime margin was 38-20.

OTI's center John McCutcheon led his team's scoring with 18 points.

Panico won the region 4 most valuable player award.

Dale Morey Favored

GULFPORT, Miss. (AP) — Dale Morey of Indianapolis showed promise Wednesday of becoming the second amateur to beat some of the nation's top home professionals in the \$5,000 Gulf Coast Invitational golf tournament.

Morey, a member of the U.S. Walker cup team last year, fired a 6-under-par 65 to serve notice he would be hard to beat when the 10th staging of the tournament opens Thursday.

Slender Eddie Merrins of Meridian, Miss., who like Morey played his collegiate golf at Louisiana State, topped the field with a 9-under-par 275 to win the 1954 tournament. Merrins' victory was the first and only for an amateur.

The four-day event is designed primarily for home pros and gives them a chance to get away from teaching chores.

Breaking Rule Probably OK

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UP) — The Professional Golfers Assn. conceded today that rules are meant to be broken—especially when a fellow has a date with President Eisenhower.

The PGA's problem started when Salmin' Sammy Snead asked to start the final round of the Miami Beach Open March 26 early so that he can keep a golfing date in White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., with the President. It was quickly pointed out that Snead would be violating two PGA rules.

But, on the other hand, PGA supervisor Ray O'Brien couldn't see the point of refusing to let one of its members fraternize with the President of the United States.

O'Brien added the committee's action on such "an unusual request" would have to be approved

at a later date but he predicted "it should not be much trouble to get it approved."
