Light Rain, Fog Prevail

Blustery March weather, wet, foggy, and cloudy, extended over broad areas of the country today. The only bright spots were in the Southwest desert region and Florida.

Light rain and fog prevailed over the Middle Atlantic Coast states, southern sections of the Ohio Valley, Tennessee and northern parts of Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi.

There was some fog and snow or snow mixed with rain in southern and central Illinois, Missouri, central Indiana and northern Arkansas. Snow fell to a depth of 2 to 4 inches in northern Missouri, with light falls in sections of Illinois and Indiana.

Heaviest rain fell in western Tennessee and Kentucky, with falls of more than an inch in some places.

Light snow fell in the northern and central Rockies and in widely scattered areas of the Great Basin.

Warmer weather was reported in most of the country except in the Northern Plains and northern Minnesota. Another batch of cold air moved southward from Canada and sent temperatures tumbling to zero and below. At Grand Forks, N.D., it was -13, a drop of 34 degrees compared with 24 hours earlier.

It also was on the cold side in the Great Lakes region with readings far below freezing.

Dulles Talks In Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles declared today that South Viet Nam has made "striking progress toward consolidation of a strong and free country" in the past year.

Dulles flew in from Thailand for a 22-hour official visit with President Ngo Dinh Diem and Foreign Secretary Vu Van Mau. He is touring the Far East after attending a conference of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization in Pakistan.

Speaking to a large crowd at Saigon's airport, he said the recent election of a constituent assembly in South Viet Nam "is a significant step toward development of a constitutional representative government."

"These achievements," he said, "justify the Vietnamese people in facing with resolute confidence the great tasks which lie ahead."

Dulles goes from here to Manila.

Girl Holds Police At Bay

ATLANTA (AP)—A 16-year-old girl with red hair, a straight razor and a switch-blade knife held suburban DeKalb County authorities at bay for three tense hours yesterday before she was disarmed.

Police Capt. Harry Christian said she placed the razor at her throat and the open knife at her side and warned officers: "One step more and I'll kill myself."

Christian and Juvenile Judge Murphy Chandler eventually persuaded her to put down the knife. Then the police captain grabbed the razor. He said his trouser leg was washed open in the struggle.

The girl was found in a wooded area near her home after chasing her stepfather and her mother across the street. They called police.

Christian said she seemed to think her family was too strict. "She told us she'd been sent to an institution last December and stayed for six weeks. She said she'd die before going back."

Juvenile authorities released the girl in the care of her uncle, Georgia's Juvenile Court law prohibits publication of the names of persons 16 or under.
