Czechs Step Up Attacks On Religion

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—The Communist rulers of Czechoslovakia have stepped up their attacks against religion, according to Czech newspapers and the reports of refugees reaching Vienna. The prime target is the Roman Catholic Church.

The latest drive concentrates on pressuring members of the Czech armed forces who still belong to churches to drop their membership and quit attending services.

At the same time the government and press are waging intensified campaigns against juvenile delinquency—including teenage drunkenness and prostitution. But they are not asking the churches to help.

RELIGION HELPED Denouncing religion and church attendance, the Czechoslovakian paper Mlada Fronta declared that "religion soon will be legally ended as something that is superfluous and detrimental to our thinking."

The Ostrava newspaper Nova Svoboda said, "Aesthetic propaganda must be carried out consistently and systematically on the largest possible scale." It called on all teachers, cultural and political workers to join the drive to explain the "harmful character" of religion.

Recent refugees interviewed by Westerners say Catholic soldiers are commanded to attend lectures attacking their church and to pledge to drop their membership.

At the same time there are renewed reports of secret arrests of more priests in Czechoslovakia. Many are reported sent to labor camps.

PROBLEM The growing problem of juvenile delinquency is attacked by numerous Czechoslovak papers, including the Communist party organ Rude Pravo and the trade unions paper Prace.

"It is a sad and tragic picture," said Prace, relating conditions in Prague, the capital.

Prague police are waging a stiff campaign against prostitution and venereal disease, Prace adds, and prostitutes are punished with fines.

"But what is a fine to prostitutes? They laugh about it," complains Prace. "And what is being done about youth from the provinces who wander about Prague? When asked what they want in the capital, they refuse to answer."

BLIND STUFFERS HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Some blind workers at the National Bank of Commerce are doing a job in three days that used to take 15 to 18 workers as long as a week. They are stuffing the annual report of Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. into envelopes to be mailed to some 60,000 stockholders.

Judge Clears Habeas Action

Circuit Judge Charles Foster of Lakeview late Tuesday dismissed a habeas corpus action brought in behalf of Burdette and Zelma Put Ocho, who claimed they were illegally held on first degree murder charges.

The Ochos are accused of the gun slaying of Edison Duffy, 90-year-old ex-convict, whose body was found on the outskirts of Klamath Falls with a bullet in the brain.

The habeas corpus proceedings were started by Defense Attorney Glenn D. Ramirez. It was his contention that Sheriff Murray Britton had no right to keep his clients in jail because District Judge D. E. Van Vactor refused to set aside waivers of preliminary hearing which the defendants had made.

At the conclusion of the hearing, Judge Foster ruled that there was no evidence that the defendants were not fully informed of their rights when they waived preliminary hearing.

The judge also pointed out that had the grand jury indicted the defendants before they were taken into custody, they would not have been given a preliminary hearing.

Judge Foster also ordered the defendants held in the county jail without bail pending grand jury action. The state was represented at the hearing by Deputy District Attorney P. K. Peckett.

Easy Danish Pastry. Soften 2 cakes yeast in 1/2 cup lukewarm water. Add 1/2 cup of evaporated milk, 3 beaten eggs, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup shortening. Stir in about 4 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour. Mix well. Beat until smooth. Spread dough in greased 9x13 inch pan. Chill in refrigerator 1 to 2 hours. Roll dough on a lightly floured board to 12x16 inch rectangle. Spread 1/2 of the dough with 1/2 cup butter. Fold unspread portion of dough over 1/2 of the shortening covered portion; then fold the third section over the other two.

Danish Breakfast Rolls. Roll dough out to a rectangle 11 1/2 x 15 inches. Cut into strips 1 inch wide and 15 inches long. Twist each strip and coil on a greased baking sheet. Cover and let rise until double in size. Bake in moderate 375-degree oven 10-12 minutes. Frost with thin coating of icing and sprinkle with finely chopped nuts.
