Today's World Of Medicine Described By Researcher

A noted researcher in the field of medicine told the Klamath Falls Knife and Fork Club Wednesday night that an ancient drug from India which has been in use there for hundreds of years is proving eminently successful in the perennial battle against mental illness.

The speaker was Dr. Milton Silverman, science editor of the San Francisco Chronicle and contributor to the Saturday Evening Post. He was presented to the club by Elmer Lemler of Merrill.

Dr. Silverman described influenza as one of the most dangerous maladies that plague the human race. "Most of us recall the terrible influenza epidemic of 1918," he said. "Twenty million persons were killed around the world in four and a half months. This baffling type of influenza came out of nowhere and then suddenly disappeared. We have no assurance that it won't appear again at any time."

According to Dr. Silverman, medical science has conquered most of the bacterial diseases but to date there is no effective cure for most virus infections. He considers the common cold just as much of an enigma today as it was 100 years ago.

The scientist also expressed great optimism over the gains that the medical profession has made in combating high blood pressure. He said some of the so-called wonder drugs which have become available in recent years have sharply cut the high blood pressure death rate.

In pursuit of new methods of fighting disease, Dr. Silverman has traveled to all parts of the world. Before closing his discussion, he offered some advice to his listeners.

"Despite all the wonderful advances science has made," he concluded, "there is no push button medicine. Thousands of people are laboring under the delusion that good health is normal, when just the opposite is true."
