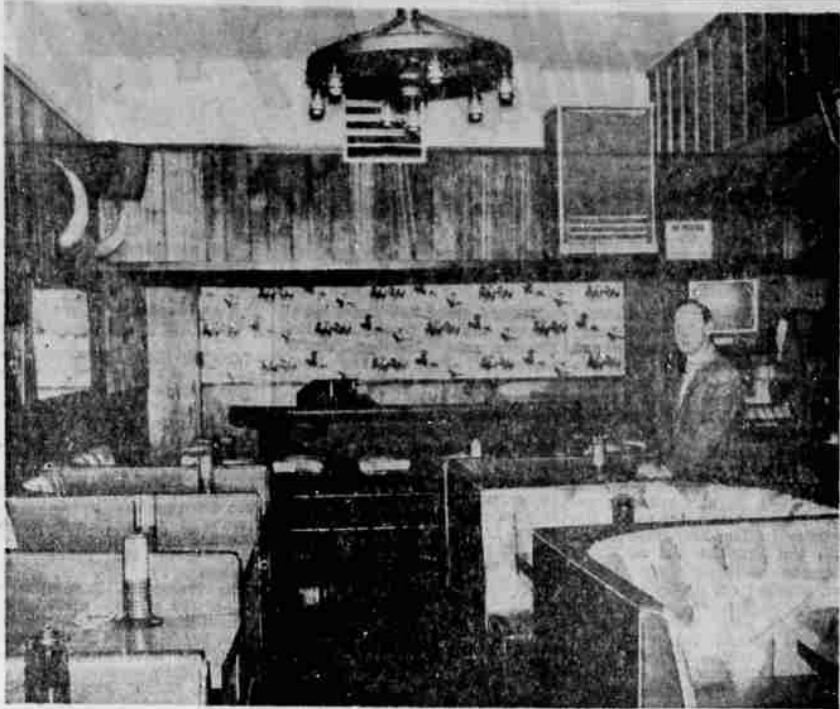

Experiences On Argentine Farm To Be Told By Youth

A full program has been lined up for Bill Abel of Astoria, an Oregon delegate to the International Farm Youth Exchange last year, when he appears in Klamath Falls next week.

Abel, who spent several months of last winter with three farm families in Argentina, has two appearances set up for each of the first three days of the week.

On Tuesday, he speaks at the Lions Club meeting at noon at the Willard Hotel, and in the evening at a joint meeting of the YMCA and the American Legion and Auxiliary.

On Wednesday, he will attend a meeting of the Conger School Parent Teachers Association at 2:30

p.m., and a meeting of the Bonanza Farm Bureau at 8 p.m. at Bonanza Elementary School.

His only appearance on Thursday will be at the Soroptimist Club at noon at the Winema Hotel.

Now 23, Abel, a senior at Oregon State College, has spent nine years in 4-H work. Not of a farm family, he carried on his club work on his parents' three acre home site at Astoria. He was also active in DeMolay, church groups, Young Grangers, Boy Scouts and the YMCA.

The International Farm Youth Exchange program, sponsored by the National 4-H Club Foundation

and the Cooperative Extension Service. Its two main objectives are to bring about better understanding among people of the world and to build a lasting peace.

Rural young people from the United States live and work on farms in other countries from four to six months, and farm youth from other countries spend about the same length of time in the United States.

Air Observers' Work Revealed

What is an aircraft observer? That question—probably asked by many in Klamath Falls, and answered by few—centers on one of the most important jobs in the Air Force today, as it was explained by Sergeant Don Adams, local USAF recruiter.

"The aircraft observer," said Sgt. Adams, "is just as important as the pilot in our jet bomber crews, and just as skilled. He is popularly known as the 'Brains of the Air Force,' and he really earns the title."

While it might be said that the pilot "drives" the airplane, Sgt. Adams went on to explain, it would be just as accurate to say that the aircraft observer "masters" the jet bomber. He does all the calculating and "figuring" necessary during a typical supersonic or near-supersonic flight, handling the navigation, electronics equipment—even dropping the bomb itself.

"It used to be," Sgt. Adams said, "that the typical bomber had a navigator, a bombardier, a radio-man, and a flight engineer. Now these jobs are all wrapped into one—and taken care of by the aircraft observer."

"It's a demanding job—just like that of a pilot," he added, "but it's rewarding too. An aircraft observer is an officer and a regular member of the flying team, goes right along with the pilot on every mission, wears his silver 'wings,' and is entitled to the same benefits of any other flyer."

These benefits, said the sergeant, include a Second Lieutenant's commission, and flying "wings" approximately one year after beginning training, uniform allowance, 30 days paid vacation a year, a

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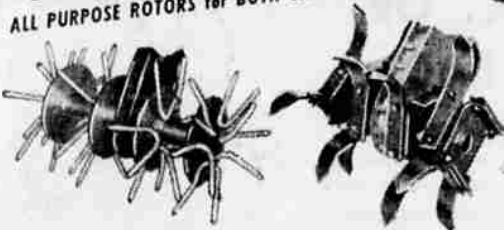
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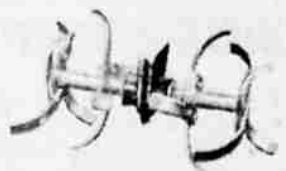
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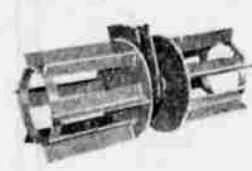
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
