

USF Dumps Ukes; Utah Records Win

CORVALLIS, Ore. (U.P.) — San Francisco, having disposed of the Pacific Coast Conference champions, UCLA, 72-61, moved on against Utah Saturday night, favored to win in another playoff step toward its second consecutive NCAA basketball title.

The teams met in the finals of the NCAA West regional playoff Saturday after UCLA and Seattle tangle in a preliminary game. Utah downed Seattle Friday night, 61-52.

UCLA had been expected to provide San Francisco with its toughest competition of the year so far, but with 6-10 All-America Bill Russell smothering UCLA's ace, 6-5 Willie Naulls, and about three other players at the same time, it became merely another game in San Francisco's record string of victories. It was the 32nd straight.

The nation's No. 1 team also gave the answer to doubters who thought the absence of guard K.C. Jones might be disastrous against a polished team like UCLA, ranked No. 8 in The Associated Press poll. Jones' eligibility ran out last month.

Intercepting Gene Brown, a slender 6-2 sophomore, flitted about the court, intercepting passes and shooting baskets as if he had been playing all season.

He wound up with scoring honors at 23 points, loud applause from the sellout crowd of 10,000 and praise from the rival coaches and his teammates.

"We all knew Brown was the best substitute on the coast," said Russell, who scored 21 points, 13 of them in the first half when San Francisco romped to a 39-21 lead. After that San Francisco coasted.

"Brown's fine performance was not at all unexpected," said Phil Woopert, San Francisco coach. John Wooden, UCLA coach, added, "he was not as strong as Jones defensively, but perhaps better offensively."

Utah led almost all the way in downing Seattle but midway through the final period Seattle rallied to knot the score at 56-56.

Gary Bergen, 6-8 forward who

had been resting on the bench with four fouls, saved the day. He went in and scored eight straight points in three minutes to provide his team with a 74-66 lead. Utah then went into a stall that preserved the margin.

Center Art Buntz again was Utah's big score, compiling 24 points, mostly on push shots from the key. Bergen had 16, Dick Stricklin had 16 for Seattle.

Jack Gardner, coach of Utah, which was ranked No. 18 in the AP poll, said of the game:

"We have a great deal of respect for San Francisco, of course, but we're going out to win. Being idle for the past week hurt us. Our edge was gone and we were sluggish in our play. I hope the game against Seattle will help ready us."

Woopert said he believed the key to the win over UCLA was Russell's guarding of Naulls.

"He completely neutralized Naulls," Woopert said. "In fact, Russell neutralized almost everyone. He blocked so many shots that the sharpshooters UCLA team could sink only 20 percent of its shots from the floor in the first half, when San Francisco took an 18-point advantage."

UCLA made only five field goals in the period. Only two of those were on shots from out in front. The other three were tips that Naulls managed when Russell was busy on the other side of the basket.

NEW YORK (U.P.) — Fearless Fraley's Facts and Figures:

A quarter of a century can make a tremendous difference in a man and so it is with Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons as he sends Nashua out today in the \$100,000 Gulfstream Park Handicap for the all-time money winning record in horse racing.

OUTSIDE

KICKED

BUCKETED

After Warren gave the EHS cagers a 33-21 heading, guard Ed Farrall bucketed another field goal to give the Axemen a four point lead. But Klamath's Cliff Sutherland, who turned in one of his finest games of the season, canned a field goal to cut the lead back to two points. After Eugene's Roger King and Sutherland exchanged quick baskets, the Axemen took a six point lead, 41-35 on field goals by Doug Lundstrom and King.

Klamath's sophomore sensation Glenn Moore hit two free throws and Earle Tichenor tallied a two-pointer from underneath the basket to slice the lead back to a 41-39 margin, but Farrall and Lundstrom put a halt to the Klamath uprising with a field goal and two free throws.

In the opening quarter, neither of the two teams could find the range and missed with regularity in their attempts from the field. Moore gave Klamath a 3-0 lead with a beautiful hook shot and one of two tries from the free throw line. Eugene tied the count at 4-4 with 4:30 left. During the remaining minutes of the opening quarter, the lead changed hands, or was tied, six different times, with Eugene holding a narrow 10-8 lead at the quarter's final horn.

FREE TOSSES

The nip and tuck battle continued in the game's second canto with the Pels holding the lead through most of the action. Sutherland tipped in a goal to knot the count at 10-10, and Donn Taucher recorded two free tosses to give Klamath the lead, 12-10 with 5:02 left. A field goal and a gift by Butch Klinton pushed the Pels into the lead, 15-10.

The Pelicans' lead held up until Warren hit with a jumper to make the scoreboard figures read 18-17 in favor of Eugene with 1:55 left in the half. In the next minute, King tossed a 3-point push shot just before the horn sounded to close the first half's action and give Eugene a 23-23 halftime margin.

Eugene went into the fourth panel trailing the Axemen 47-39. With 1:04 left in the game, Eugene held a 10-point 51-41 lead. This margin was soon cut to four points, 51-47 as Klamath tallied three quick field goals, one each by Taucher, Klinton and Dave Peple. This was the closest the Pels could come to overtaking their foes.

Sutherland led the scoring pace for the Pels by dumping in 16 points. Moore and Taucher also tallied in double figures with 11 and 10 point scoring efforts. Warren's 19 points was high for the game, while teammates Lundstrom and King followed with 11 and 10.

Klamath Falls In A-1 Action

McARTHUR COURT, Eugene, Ore. (Special) — A 6-3 son of a former University of Oregon basketball coach spelled out defeat for the Klamath Union High School Pelicans in their battle for fourth place in the 1956 state A-1 high school basketball tournament here Friday afternoon.

Charlie Warren, a prize sophomore basketball player, and son of John Warren, one-time cage mentor at Oregon, spearheaded the Eugene High Axemen to a 69-54 victory in the first Friday afternoon game of the 35th annual A-1 prep classic. The loss eliminated Klamath from the tournament.

It was Klamath's second straight loss after winning a first round clash from McMinnville, Lincoln of Portland turned back the Pels 57-44 Thursday.

Eugene's Warren scored 19 points and picked off 15 rebounds to lead the Axemen into their quarterfinal for fourth place in a game played yesterday afternoon. And it was Warren who put the Axemen under the Pelicans in their attempt to get back into the running of the week-long tournament when the tide turned in the third period.
