Eulalona Chapter DAR Hears Forester Talk

Eulalona Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, and their guests met in the lecture room of the Klamath County Library, Monday evening, March 5 at 8 o'clock. The meeting was opened with the pledge of allegiance followed by a prayer by the chaplain, Mrs. Charles Waters. Mrs. Guy Barton, regent, then turned the meeting over to the chairman of the program, Mrs. Julian Ager.

Mrs. Ager stated that the theme of the program was "Conservation." She introduced the speaker for the evening, Robert L. Cooper, ranger of the Klamath District of the Rogue River National Forest. Cooper, who was assisted by Verne Smith, showed two films on watershed conservation. The first was on the Cowetta Watershed Experiment Station in the Appalachian Mountains. This picture showed actual

experiments by the Forestry Service. The second film was concerning how wildlife is affected by proper conservation of our watersheds.

Following the films Cooper spoke briefly on the three major problems in this area, fire, logging and grazing damage. He stated that the major cause of logging damage is from roads made on excessive grades. Roads are now being constructed properly with the proper drainage, he said. In order to prevent loss of water from fire damage, the forest service immediately moves in after a fire and plants grass in the bed of ashes. Then they follow this planting with the planting of two year old seedling trees.

It takes from 10 to 25 years for these seedlings to grow large enough to hold the water, which makes the planting of the grass invaluable in conserving the water.

Cooper has been in the forestry service for 23 years and the past eight years has been stationed in Klamath Falls. Following his remarks, there was a short question and answer period.

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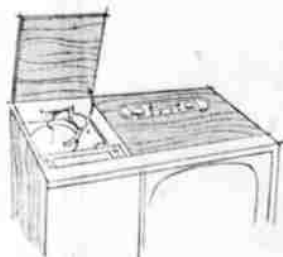


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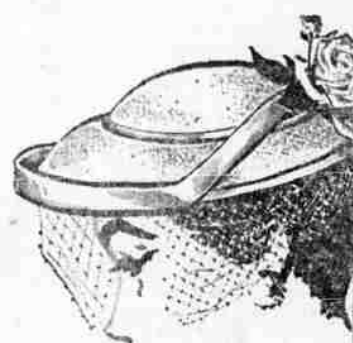
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
