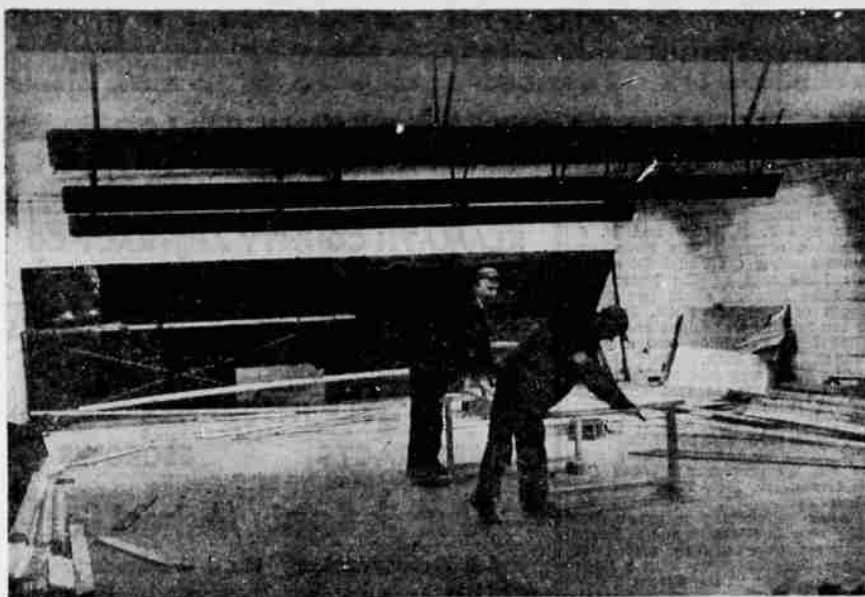

City Policemen Build New Pistol Range

After putting in more than 15 months of volunteer labor, members of the Klamath Falls Police Beneficiary Association should be opening their new pistol range and lounge within a few weeks.

City Detective R. N. (Bud) Adkins, chairman of the association pistol range committee, said that he has been able to whack about \$5,000 off the cost of the building, which, he said, would have cost about \$20,000 if commercially built. In addition to a large number of outright donations, many suppliers have reduced the price they ask for the supplies.

Adkins said that one of his best coups was the acquisition of the 5,400 pounds of boiler plate that was installed as the backstop behind the targets. He got it for two cents a pound at a time when the going rate was eight cents.

Other savings included a \$450 heater for \$70 and savings of \$160 on plywood, \$30 on moulding, \$100 on other lumber, and so on and on.

All of this material has been assembled in a modernistic concrete block building on Fourth Street about half a block from the city police station. In the building will be a lounge, kitchenette, shower facilities and the range itself.

The 50 foot range will have 10 firing points and a reloading room, where cartridges may be reloaded and reused. Every effort is being made to include all of the latest safety devices in the range, which will have a wall at the firing points so that firers will not inadvertently step forward and into the line of fire.

In the front part of the building, the volunteer crews are setting up a lounge and kitchenette, which will have a snack bar which can be used for beneficiary association meetings and functions.

Many of the furnishings and other final details will have to wait until well after the official "open-

ing," planned for the near future. This is because the association has used up a good part of its cash reserve, and must conserve what is left for its various beneficial uses, such as aid for sick officer-members.

However, the donation of 18 theater type chairs, which eventually will wind up in the spectators' row in back of the firing points, will be used in the lounge portion of the building until other furniture is obtained.

The kitchenette will be equipped with a sink and work space, as well as a table-model electric grill.

The association has not yet developed plans for the full utilization of the range, but possibilities include the organization of adult and youth groups interested in pistol shooting. Final plans on

these various uses will be made as things develop, Association President Walter Conrady said recently.

The association, organized in 1936 is dedicated to bettering the lot of Klamath Falls policemen. Originally organized as a means of providing a pension plan, the association funds are now used to aid police officers who are ill or otherwise in need. The association will also pay funeral expenses for officers who die while in service.

The present officers, who took over on January 1, are Conrady, John Wilson, secretary, and Oscar Gerleve, treasurer.

Officers in December, 1954, when the land for the building was acquired, were Gerleve, president; Charles Shipman, secretary and Adkins, treasurer.

OSC Planning Science Show

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Rockets, sun-driven engines and hundreds of other exhibits made by "school-age scientists" will go on display at Oregon State College March 24 to 30 in the annual Northwest Science Exposition.

Between 300 and 400 entries from Oregon and Washington will be displayed, representing top exhibits from city, county and districts shows held during the past month.

Judges will rate exhibits in four divisions in grades 1 through 12. Three science categories—physical, physiological and biological—are included. Judging is based on originality, scientific thought, completeness, workmanship, clarity and dramatic values.

The annual show is sponsored by the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry. Since it was founded three years ago, it has attracted wide attention for quality and number of varied exhibits.
