

June OTI Grads Interviewed By California University

Two representatives of the University of California Radiation Laboratory at Livermore spent Thursday and Friday on the Oregon Tech campus, interviewing students who will be graduated as technicians in June. The trip here was for the purpose of recruiting employees at the close of the current school term at Oregon Tech, Director W. D. Purvine said.

R. H. Thompson of the laboratory personnel department and Schalsky, mechanical equipment department, told Purvine and Walter Hoag, dean of men at OTI, that they have an immediate need for technicians.

OTI students who make successful application at this time will be processed for security clearance during the next few months and will be hired effective July 1, according to Thompson and Schalsky.

The University of California Radiation Laboratory is an AEC contractor and employees receive state of California benefits. The laboratory has two locations, the one at Livermore covering a square mile of area at present with an expansion of approximately 800 employees contemplated for the near future. The parent location is at Berkeley. The laboratory was established 15 years ago and employs a total of more than 3,500 men, working on projects assigned by the Atomic Energy Commission.

Thompson addressed senior students from the mechanical and engineering associate department on Thursday morning.

"For each fact now known about atomic energy, there are at least 100 unknown," he declared. For this reason, he said, students with mechanical technical ability who have the ingenuity to fabricate,

assemble and understand new products are chosen. A new technician is assigned to a senior group at the laboratory for six months to a year. Extension courses through the University of California are also available to help employees of the laboratory advance their skills, he said.

In conferences with Purvine and Hoag, Thompson and Schalsky discussed ways in which OTI courses can help prepare men for the atomic energy field.
