Funeral services will be announced by O'Hair's Memorial Chapel.

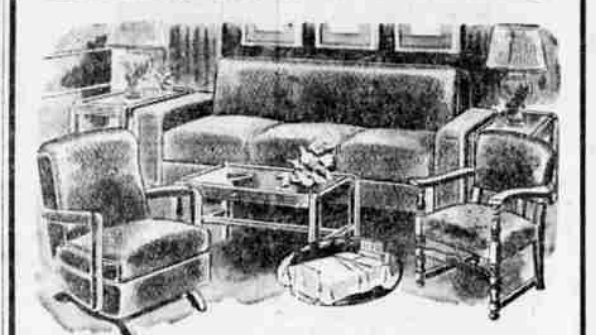
