

British Sure Of Breaking Cyprus Terror Movement

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — British authorities appeared confident today they can break the Cyprus terrorist movement within six months and pave the way for new negotiations on the island's future.

Brig. George H. Baker, chief of staff of the Mediterranean island's security force, told newsmen his men had made a "significant break" into EOKA. This is the terrorist branch of the union-with-Greece movement in this British colony.

"I won't say we've broken it (EOKA), but the developments have been significant," he added.

Bromfield Dies During Long Coma

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Louis Bromfield, noted Pulitzer Prize-winning author, newspaper columnist and militant advocate of soil conservation, died last night in University Hospital here. He was 56.

His physician said death was due to kidney and liver failure caused by a "jaundice infection." Bromfield was admitted to the hospital Feb. 28 suffering from "hemorrhagic jaundice."

Friends said he had been in a coma for the last 24 hours.

LITERARY CAREER
Bromfield's literary career, which started with the publication of "The Green Bay Tree," reached its zenith when he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1926 for his novel "Early Autumn." It was a story of a Massachusetts Pentland family.

Bromfield traveled widely and some of his more than two score novels reflect the scenes he visited. Many of them also were made into motion pictures.

Upon his return to this country in 1928 he set about selecting a site in Ohio where he could settle down and achieve "real continuity" and "real permanence" of living.

He purchased five farms, 12 miles from Mansfield, Ohio, where he was born Dec. 27, 1896. He christened the 1,000 acres "Malabar Farm" after a section of the India coast where the Bromfields once lived.

There he set about conducting experiments in scientific farming and soil conservation. He wrote many articles on the subject and once testified before a congressional committee.

VIEWS AIDED
In recent years he wrote a weekly newspaper column in which he aired his views on everything from politics to American manners and morals.

After ambulance service in World War I, Bromfield worked first as a reporter for the New York City News Assn. He subsequently became a wire editor for The Associated Press; a private tutor; foreign editor and critic of the magazine Musical America; theater, music and art critic for the Bookman and a staff member of Time magazine.

School Gym Sale Deferred

It has been decided to defer action for 60 days on the proposed sale of the old Chilquin School gym by Klamath County school district, Carroll Howe, county superintendent of schools, revealed Saturday.

The school board had invited bids for the sale of the old elementary school gym, located on the Chilquin School site, to be opened on March 15 at the office of John F. Hayden, school district clerk. The building was to have been moved from the site by the purchaser by June 1.

Earlier last week at a community discussion group meeting in Chilquin, residents of the area voted to petition the school board to give first consideration to sale of the building to local Chilquin interests. Its use as a community center or other civic building was discussed by the group.

A committee from Chilquin met with the school board Thursday morning.

"We need at least 60 days to evaluate the need for that building in Chilquin," Howe commented. The advent of new industry to the area changes the situation, he added.

No bids were received or opened on Thursday.

Wheat Loan Advice Given

Klamath County farmers are reminded that Commodity Credit Corporation loans on 1955-crop wheat will mature March 31.

This means, says William Burnett, chairman of the Klamath Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, that farmers with wheat under price support are approaching the deadline for important decisions. If they wish to market their wheat the loan must be paid off before the March 31 deadline. If they wish to use their available farm storage now occupied by the 1955 wheat for the crop to be harvested this season, they may turn the wheat over to CCC in payment for the loan.

In designated counties where oil-farm storage to take care of CCC-owned wheat is limited, farmers also have the opportunity of keeping their 1955 wheat on their farms under resale loan, and receiving the usual storage fee. Klamath is one of the counties where farmers have the opportunity to resell their 1955 wheat. Those who elect to resell must notify their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in the Tower Theater building on or before March 31. Wheat under loan and offered for resale, as well as the bins where this wheat is stored, must meet the usual inspection before it will qualify for a resale loan.

Burnett passes on these reminders at this early date to give Klamath wheat growers plenty of time to decide what they want to do and to make their plans accordingly. He also reminds farmers who need additional farm storage that there is still time to take care of that before the next crop is harvested. Plans for acceptable farm storage structures are available at the County ASC office at Klamath and from the County Extension Agent.

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Spray Time In Basin; Hints Given

It's dormant spray time in the Klamath Basin from now until just before the buds begin to open. Good results can be had as low as temperatures are above 50 degrees and no wind stirring. Dormant spray should be applied to nearly all trees, shrubs and vines that drop or lose their leaves in winter. Do not use dormant spray on evergreens, as the strong spray will damage the evergreen foliage. A diluted or foliage strength spray should be used on the evergreens.

Dormant spray is very important because it destroys hosts of fungus spores and prevents rather than cures diseases like peach leaf curl, blights, powdery mildew, scab and many others. It helps to control many overwintering insects. Fruit trees, shade trees, berries, ornamental shrubs and especially roses are all benefited by dormant spraying. Complete coverage of all parts of the plants, including the ground area and litter under the plants, is essential if maximum results are to be obtained.

Fruit trees: an application of dormant spray followed by one or two sprays at intervals of four to six weeks during the early growing season has proven sufficient to obtain clean fruit when DDT is used. On apples and pears it is advisable to make four applications for best results. There is no insecticide available at the present time that will ultimately result in a clean crop of fruit with one easy application.

Combination sprays may be applied during the summer months to yearling trees to control earwigs, aphids, mites, mosquitoes and hosts of other pests. Effectiveness of mosquito sprays are governed by wind and rain. Large areas or entire blocks should be sprayed for maximum efficiency on mosquito control.

When purchasing insecticides, bear in mind that general purpose sprays are made to control a number of different pests. Good results are possible on a general basis. If a specific type of insect is causing the damage, buy the insecticide made especially for its control and maximum results will be yours.

The spraying program for apples and pears and other fruits as outlined herein applies only to the Klamath Basin and does not necessarily follow in other climate zones.

Freight Cars Leap Track In Arkansas
TURRELL, Ark. (AP)—Thirty-nine cars in the middle of a long freight train leaped the track, plunged down an embankment and some caught fire in a spectacular wreck near this small northeast Arkansas town yesterday.

At least 18 boxcars were destroyed or considered almost a total loss and 13 others were damaged. Prices of the damaged cars, however, were not estimated.
