Independent Voter May Stump Oregon Republican Strategy

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—The big question in Oregon today is, "Can you like Ike and Wayne Morse at the same time?"

Judging from a survey of political opinion, it wouldn't be surprising if the independent-minded Oregon voter confounded Republican strategy and said a paradoxical "Yes."

Republicans, deeply determined to unseat Morse, are billing it as a direct test between President Eisenhower and the outspoken Democratic senator who was elected as a Republican in 1950. But not everyone sees it that way.

Miss Truman Makes Plans

NEW YORK (UP)—Margaret Truman went ahead today with plans for a simple wedding minus traditional trimmings in her home town on April 21.

The long white dress and the sentimental solos both will be missing when she weds E. Clifton Daniel, 43, Margaret said in a news conference late Monday. She will wear a short beige dress made in Rome by designer Nicole Pontana and have only organ music.

The 32-year-old daughter of former President Truman, who is frankly sentimental about true love and old acquaintances, is not superstitious about wedding customs. She said she won't even wear "the usual something old, something new, etc." unless somebody in the family insists.

Miss Truman disclosed her future wedding plans in person a day before she discussed her past boy friends in print in the second installment of her memoirs, "Son of a Preacher Man," appearing in "Good Housekeeping" magazine.

Only the two families will be invited to the 4 p.m. ceremony in the Trinity Episcopal Church in Independence, Mo., where her mother and father also were married. Margaret said, "Only old and close friends will attend the reception at the Truman home afterwards," she said, and added, "Mother is running most of this anyway, so I don't know all of the details."

Her two attendants will be Mrs. John E. Horton, the former Drucie Snyder, and Mrs. W. Coleman Blanton, the former Mary Shaw. Both of whom are mentioned frequently in her memoirs, including references to their first loves.

Potato, Onion Ruling Given

SALEM (AP)—The state Department of Agriculture ordered Tuesday that potato and onion brand labels must be registered if the grower's or packer's name and address don't appear on the containers.

These brands must be registered with the secretary of state and the state Department of Agriculture.

Frank McKennon, chief of the Division of Plant Industry, said the registration requirement is being made so the department can trace the responsibility for any Oregon pack of potatoes or onions.

Brand registration must include the name and address of the grower or packer, a facsimile of the brand, and information on how it will be used. Container brands must be large enough to be easily readable and must be approved by the department.

"There's nobody like him," a Democratic taxi driver said admiringly of the President. "Sure, I'll vote for him again." And Morse? "He's a real fighter, that guy. He's okay."

RIDING HIGH

Eisenhower is riding high in popularity in Oregon, which he carried by a fat margin in 1952. How much of it will rub off on Morse's Republican opponent, probably secretary of the Interior McKay, could very well decide the Senate election.

Republicans, who call Morse a "turncoat" because of his party-switching, will be spurred by other incentives. His retirement would help them regain Senate control—now 49-47 Democratic. And it would remove one of the administration's sharpest critics.

Oregon Democrats, however, almost gleefully welcomed Douglas McKay's last-minute candidacy. While hesitant to forecast their presidential chances, they predicted Morse would receive solid Democratic support and attract 10 to 20 per cent of the Republican vote.

Not all Republicans were happy that the party's national leaders, with Eisenhower's warmly worded endorsement, nudged McKay into filling for the May 18 primary. Some elements felt they had two less vulnerable candidates in Lamar Tooez, Portland attorney, who withdrew immediately, and former State Sen. Phil Hitchcock.

Hitchcock, a prominent Presbyterian lay leader, refused to step out. He remained on the Republican ballot along with Elmer Deetz, a dairyman, and George Allwater, a political unknown.

Morse is opposed for the Democratic nomination only by a political unknown, Woody Smith of Hood River.

McKay has been the favorite target of Morse's "giveaway" charges against the Eisenhower power partnership and other natural resources policies. These are sensitive issues in the Far West—especially in the Pacific Northwest, where the cry for "cheap power" is loudest.

"I'm as delighted to see McKay in the Senate race," said Democratic State Chairman Howard Morgan, "as (Republican National Chairman) Leonard Hall is to see him out of the Cabinet."

But McKay is ready to defend his and Eisenhower's policies, and has challenged Democrats to "name one thing" the Republicans have given away.

McKay plans to resign as interior secretary before the primary. A former Oregon governor, McKay is 62 but in good shape, he says, to enter what he views as a tough campaign. Morse is 56.

Oregon, once a Republican stronghold, is gradually drifting toward a Democratic registration as its population grows.

PRO EISENHOWER

Pronounced pro Eisenhower spirit prevails among the voters despite the shift in registration and active signs of discontent in the wheat and cattle country of eastern Oregon.

Eisenhower is unopposed for Oregon's 18 delegates to the Republican National Convention. A sampling of sentiment turned up some hesitancy to see Richard Nixon on the ticket again, but most reaction was favorable to the vice president.

A young Portland file clerk said she'd vote for Eisenhower although she was sorry to see him run because of his health. A gray-haired nurse, heartily endorsing the President, said she knew of several cardiac cases still going strong after many years.

In Grants Pass, near the California line, Glen Provost, a welder and Republican, declared he's "for Ike and nothing against Nixon." It was "Ike and Nixon without reserve" with insurance agent Carl Kennedy, also a Republican. Democrat Henry Turk, a gladiolus bulb grower, voted for Eisenhower last time but says he will not again.

In Roseburg, however, Democrat Marge Russell, a bartender, gave Eisenhower as her choice and "Nixon is okay for Ike so he's okay for me."

In Eugene, one Democratic housewife declared for Adlai Stevenson; another said, "I'll take Ike over Stevenson." The Republican manager of a large department store backed Eisenhower. He said the overriding influence in this university and lumbering town is prosperity. "The people like it," he said.

SALESMAN CHANGES

A Democratic salesman in Salem, who had just changed his registration from Republican, contended business drops when farm income slackens and "the Democrats do more for the farmers."

A Republican farmer visiting in the state capital also sided up the farm problem as the big issue but said the administration's soil bank program will work "if we give it a try."

Jess Gard of Portland, Republican national committeeman, predicted Eisenhower's Oregon margin would surpass his 420,815 to

Politico Sees Log Shortage

WASHINGTON (AP)—Unless the government speeds up its timber sales, Oregon and Washington lumber and plywood mills will be faced with a serious log shortage this spring, Rep. Mack (R-Wash.) said Tuesday.

He said he had advised Richard Mearns, chief of the Forest Service, that heavy snows in the two states this winter had brought about closing of most logging camps for 30 to 40 days.

Most manufacturing plants used their surplus logs during this period and, unless logging is speeded up, will be forced to curtail operations, he said.

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
