Fair Board To Call Bids

TULELAKE—Bids will be called for Wednesday, March 21 for two new buildings for the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds. Bids will be opened in the offices of the 10-A fair district, it is announced by William Whitaker, fair manager.

The two buildings include a swine and sheep barn, 70 by 200 feet, to be built of rigid structural steel containing 156 built-in pens, and commercial exhibit building with a floor space 50 by 100 feet. This building will be enclosed with power and sewer outlets for home appliance fixture exhibits.

Bids are expected to be called for within the next few weeks on a third building to house home economics exhibits. This building, with two wings will have a central floor space of 40 by 80 feet and will be built of redwood, glass and pumice bricks to conform to other architecture on the fairgrounds.

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Bus Boycott Trial Enters Second Day

MONTEGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — The state planned to present new testimony today in an effort to show that a 27-year-old Negro minister conspired to clamp a crippling boycott on city buses here.

On trial in Circuit Court is the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., the first of 90 Negro leaders called to answer indictments resulting from the 16-week-old protest against racial segregation.

Mrs. Erna Dungee, the last witness to testify at the opening of the trials yesterday, is expected to be recalled to the stand today.

Mrs. Dungee is financial secretary of the Montgomery Improvement Assn., a newly formed Negro organization which the state says is headed by King. Prosecuting attorneys are trying to establish the organization's role in the bus boycott.

The 90 Negroes have all exercised their right to demand separate trials. All have waived the right to trial by jury, leaving it up to Circuit Judge Eugene Carter to decide on their guilt or innocence.

Mrs. Dungee yesterday identified bank deposits totaling about \$50,000 made out in the name of the improvement association. She also identified photostats of checks totaling almost \$5,000 signed by herself and King in payment for gasoline.

The prosecution sought to bring out whether the gasoline money was used to provide rides for Negro bus boycotters. Carter ruled out the question at the request of defense attorneys.

The Negro woman said drivers of the automobiles used in a car pool to transport Negroes received a standard wage of \$24 a week.

Brinks Robber Put On 'List'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI off by men wearing halloween masks.

Monday put James Ignatius Faherty, alleged Brink's robber, on its list of "10 most wanted men."

He is one of two men still at large of the group which has been formally charged at Boston with looting a Brink's money transfer station there of \$1,218,211 in cash and \$1,557,133 in checks and securities in January 1956.

The FBI in January of this year announced "solution" of that crime. At that time it arrested six alleged members of the gang, placed detainees against two others already in prison for other offenses, announced one other had died and listed Faherty and Thomas F. Richardson, 48-year-old Boston longshoreman, as fugitives.

The FBI said Faherty was one of the architects of the spectacular Brink's foray, on which the gang spent more than a year of planning and rehearsal. It was pulled

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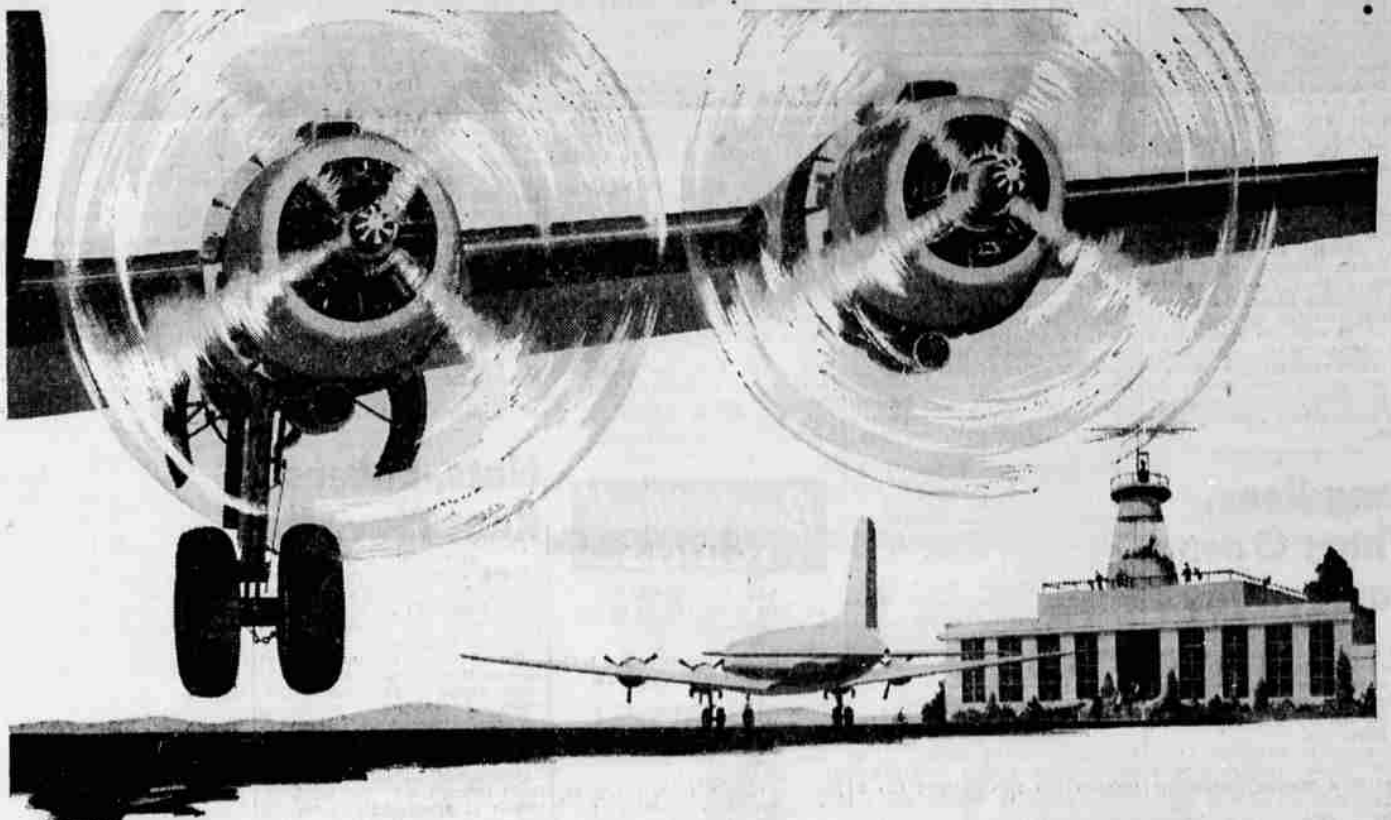
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
