National Spud Act To Be Told

The national potato marketing act includes compulsory federal state inspection, labeling of all potatoes in commerce, with the state where grown, packer's name and address, U.S. or state grade, and prohibits the shipment of potatoes below the U.S. No. 2 grade.

The potato marketing act, as passed by Congress this year, will be subject to referendum and approval by two-thirds of the growers. There are certain exceptions applying to certified seed potatoes and potatoes repacked in individual retail stores.

Bonn Leader Warns West About Reds

BONN, Germany (UP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer warned the West today to keep up its guard because the new Soviet "smiles" policy has not eased the tensions of the cold war.

He said that only if the free nations of the West remain united and stable in their alliances will the Soviets finally permit an East-West settlement.

To help maintain that unity and stability, Adenauer pledged that the Bonn Republic would carry out its promise to have a 12-division, 500,000 man German armed force ready to take its place in the NATO alliance within three years as scheduled.

The 80-year-old Adenauer gave his views and promises in an interview with United Press. He received this reporter in his office at the Bonn chancellery in the first such interview he has granted since the West German Parliament gave him the final okay last week to press ahead with rearmament.

He stressed that there has been no letup in the cold war despite the switch in Soviet tactics from frowns and threats to smiles and charm.

"I think you will agree with me," he said, "that, despite the changed Soviet tactics, the tensions in the world have not eased. The reason is that the causes of tension have not been removed—that is to say, conditions of injustice in different parts of the world, such as the division of Germany."

Then, in a sweeping survey of cold war issues, the Chancellor made these other major points:

1. Any sign of Western weakness can only encourage the Reds.

2. Continued talks between the United States and Russia on world problems are "particularly important," but the time is not yet ripe for another Big Four conference.

3. West Germany will not lag in her rearmament time table.

4. He has several invitations to visit the United States this year, and is always ready to do so.

College League Support Asked

PORTLAND (UP)—Campus chapters of the Oregon College League of Young Republicans will be asked to support the candidacy of Philip S. Hitchcock for the Republican nomination to the U.S. Senate.

The organization's executive board, meeting here Sunday, passed a resolution endorsing Hitchcock, the ex-state senator who will oppose Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay in Oregon's May 18 primary election. The resolution will be passed on to college chapters throughout the state for action.

Val Pavlovskis, chairman of the league, said the resolution supporting Hitchcock in the race was introduced by Gerry Jones, a University of Oregon student who heads the league council for eleven Western states.

It was the first such action under a recent constitutional amendment permitting the GOP organization to express preferences among primary candidates. It reversed a board decision reached in January

not to make primary endorsements.

Jones was quoted in the resolution as saying "Phil Hitchcock would be the most effective candidate that the Republican Party could choose to oppose the incumbent Wayne Morse."

The winning of Morse's seat for the Republicans is a major GOP goal in the fall elections, and the main reason McKay entered the race. McKay is expected to resign from the Cabinet about May 1 and will be in Oregon next weekend to get his campaign underway.

Hitchcock already has started his campaign, having made several speeches last week.

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Smith Studies Tax Proposal

CORVALLIS (UP)—Gov. Elmo Smith said Monday he is studying a proposal that the State Tax Commission be transformed into a State Department of Revenue, which would collect all taxes at the state level.

Addressing the opening of the annual five-day valuation course for county assessors and their deputies, the governor said the reorganized department also would supervise problems relating to local finance.

Gov. Smith declared that local government must modernize its system of property tax administration.

"At the heart of local government is the property tax," he said. "At the heart of the property tax is the fair distribution of the

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
