

National Spud Market Asked

WASHINGTON (UP)—Rep. Harlan Hagen (D-Calif.) introduced a bill Monday to establish a national potato marketing program. He said this is necessary "to insure stability in the potato industry."

Under the bill, restrictions on processing and shipment of potatoes would go into effect if a referendum showed two-thirds of growers by number and production favored them.

The restrictions would include a ban on shipment of potatoes of less than No. 2 grade, mandatory inspection of shipments under most circumstances, and labeling to show state of origin, grade and the grower's name.

"I intend to seek an early hearing on this legislation," Hagen said. "It is necessary that these regulations be enacted to insure stability in the potato industry."

Airman Enters Training Class

SHEPPARD AFB, Texas — A-3C Lawrence A. Sykes, son of Mrs. W. T. Hooks, 1310 Lookout, has entered the United States Air Force Technical Training School at Sheppard Air Force Base, located near Wichita Falls, Texas.

Before entering the Air Force, he was in the Army Reserve in Klamath Falls.

During his specialized training as a student at Sheppard, he will receive intensive training designed to provide him with the thorough knowledge and basic skills which he will be required to possess for his work as an aircraft and engine mechanic.

Upon completion of the course, along with the majority of graduates in his class, he will be assigned to one of the major Air Force Commands for on-the-job experience, or will enter a course of advanced training.

He entered the Air Force on November 29, 1955.

While in the Army Reserve, he served with Company C, 311th Military Police Battalion. He enlisted under the program in which young men may serve six months on active duty and complete their military obligation through reserve service.

However, he elected to transfer to the Air Force, where he will serve as a regular, career man.

His ex-reserve commander, Captain Walter M. Risse of Bonanza, said that his transfer demonstrates "the flexibility of the modern reserve setup." He urged any young men to attend meetings of his and other Klamath Falls reserve units.
