### Missionary Returns To KF

Dorothy Uhlir, missionary to Thailand from the First Christian Church of Klamath Falls, arrived in San Francisco on a Pan American Airliner, Friday morning, March 16.

Miss Uhlir was met by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Uhlig of Klamath Falls, and delegations from the First Christian Church, Klamath Falls, and the San Jose Bible College, San Jose, California.

For the past five years she has been at a mission station, Talat Chienkam, in northern Thailand. In addition to conducting a daily medical clinic, Miss Uhlir has taught in a leper village, and taken various missionary trips to remote villages in the mountains.

She is at present taking part on the program of the Northwest Missionary Conference in Eugene, Oregon and will return to Klamath Falls, this weekend.

Sunday, March 25, Miss Uhlir will bring the 11 o'clock message at the First Christian Church, Ninth and Pine. Following the services she will be honored at a dinner held in the church dining room, where she will give further information concerning her work.

In a few weeks Miss Uhlir will leave for Kentucky where she will take a six months midwifery course. The rest of her one year furlough will be spent here at home and visiting churches interested in the work in Thailand.

### Oscar Award Rites Become Major Television Event

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Hollywood's traditional big event of the year, the Oscar ceremony, has become more of a top-rated television "spectacular" this year and less of an awards ceremony.

The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences Wednesday night hands out more than 40 gold statuettes for the best pictures and players of 1955. But because of the high rating the TV show won last year the old-time Academy Awards ceremony of years back has been streamlined to the bone to make it a fast-paced TV program.

Producer Bill Kayden, on this fourth telecast of the Oscar Derby, has weeded out all but the essentials for the program. It needs only the glamour stars and a funny script by master-of-ceremonies Jerry Lewis to get a big rating.

**NAMES DROPPED**  
This year for the first time in Academy history most of the nominees' names won't be read.

"We'll repeat the nominees for the acting awards only," Kayden said. "The nominees already were mentioned on the nominations telecast last month."

Most of the awards will be presented by this year's acting nominees—Jennifer Jones (by film from England), Anna Magnani (by film from Italy), Katharine Hepburn (in New York), Jack Lemmon, Arthur Kennedy, Joe Mantell, Sal Mineo, Arthur O'Connell, Peggy Blair (by film from Spain), Peggy Lee, Marisa Pavan, Jo Van Fleet, Natalie Wood, James Cagney, Spencer Tracy, Ernest Borgnine, Frank Sinatra.

The top acting awards will be presented by last year's Oscar winners—Marlon Brando (by film from Manila), Grace Kelly, Edmund O'Brien and Eva Marie Saint.

**ELIMINATED**  
"We also eliminated film clips of the nominated pictures," the producer went on. "The show has faster pace."

The stage setting at the Hollywood Pantages Theater has been simplified to a huge Oscar in front of a big panel. This year the show was stretched to 1 1/2 hours to include the honorary awards.

TV wanted to make an even deeper inroad in the awards; Telecast the show in color.

"But it would have meant using the balcony for lights and it would have eliminated half of the audience," said the producer. "It would have been less an Academy Awards show."

### 'Battle Of The Bawds' Begins

DANVILLE, Ill. (UP)—The mayor of Danville and the commanding general of nearby Chanute Air Force Base feuded today over whether the town's bawdy houses are corrupting the general's men.

Mayor Girth N. Hicks called Brig. Gen. A. M. Minton a "publicity seeking, swivel-chair general, and we will look after our city," Hicks said in an open letter.

Minton retorted that eight of his airmen had come down with venereal disease after visits to nine brothels in Danville.

He called for an open conference to map plans for protecting his men.

"It is the public responsibility as well as mine to be concerned with the welfare of the 17-20 year old airmen in my command," he said.

### Jury Convicts Negro Brothers

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (UP)—An all-white Circuit Court jury convicted two Negro brothers of beating a University of Alabama student but spared them a heavy prison sentence.

Arthur Washington, 23, and John Washington, 19, were fined \$500 yesterday and sentenced to six months in jail for attacking a 19-year-old freshman in anger over mob action against Katherine Lucy, a Negro coed later expelled from the university.

The brothers were indicted for assault with intent to murder, which carries a sentence of 2 to 20 years on conviction. The jury found the Washingtons guilty of a lesser charge of assault and battery, a misdemeanor. They did not appeal.

Samuel Perrin Taylor, the white student, testified that he was attacked by the brothers without cause the night of Feb. 14, eight days after Miss Lucy was driven from the campus.

Defense attorney William Allen said that "the main provocation was the tenseness of the situation here at the university and at Tuscaloosa at that time. There was no malice toward Taylor."
